

No Sale Wednesday at Exchange Due to Light Listings, Holiday

Due to the holiday yesterday, there were too few listings on the Lancaster Poultry Exchange to warrant a sale on Wednesday.

LANCASTER — Broilers averaged 22.14 cents a pound at Friday auction at the Lancaster Poultry Exchange with 67,900 birds being sold.

The price range was from 21½ cents to 22½ cents.

In addition to the broilers, 4,100 Leghorns were sold for 13¾ and 13½ cents, 760 capettes sold at 24¼ and 26¼ cents, and a lot of 2,500 Silver Crosses sold for 20½ cents.

Lancaster Markets: Cattle Slow, Hogs Show 50 to 75 Cent Gain

LANCASTER, May 29 — CATTLE. Three days 3,765 week ago, three days last week 4,320. Compared with last Wednesday slaughter steers slow mostly 25-50 cents lower, some sales 75 cent off. Heifers in small supply around 25 cent lower, cows mostly steady except utility and commercial beef type cows 25 cent lower, bulls fully steady.

Stockers and feeders supplies comprised around 35 per cent stockers and feeders and 10 per cent cows. Slow Steady. Bulk choice fed steers this week 22.75-24, a few loads high choice and mixed high choice and prime 24.25-25.25, a couple lots \$25.50 and \$25.75. Most good and low choice steers 20.50-22.50; a few standard and low good \$18.50-20.

Standard and good heifers \$17.50-21.50, a few choice to 22. Cutter, utility and commercial cows \$13-17; canners mostly \$11-11.75. Utility and commercial bulls \$17-19.50, good fed yearling bulls \$17-19.50, good grade stockers and feeders and light yearlings 490-950 lbs \$21.50-23.50, a few lots to 24. Good grade partly fattened steers for further feeding \$22-23.25.

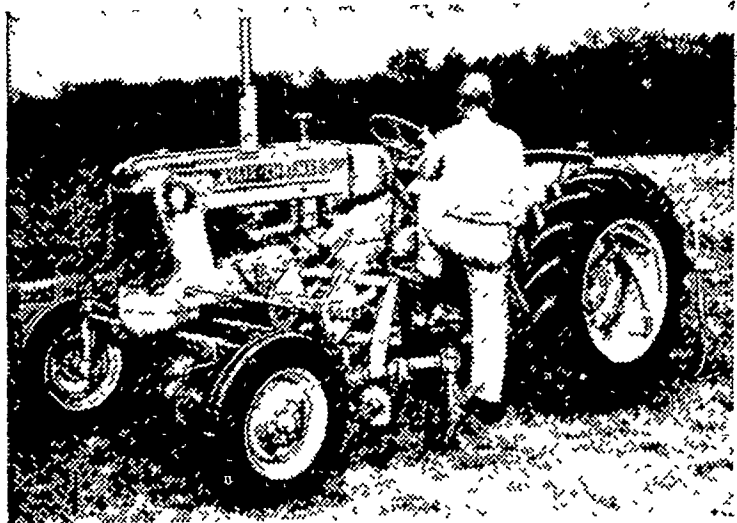

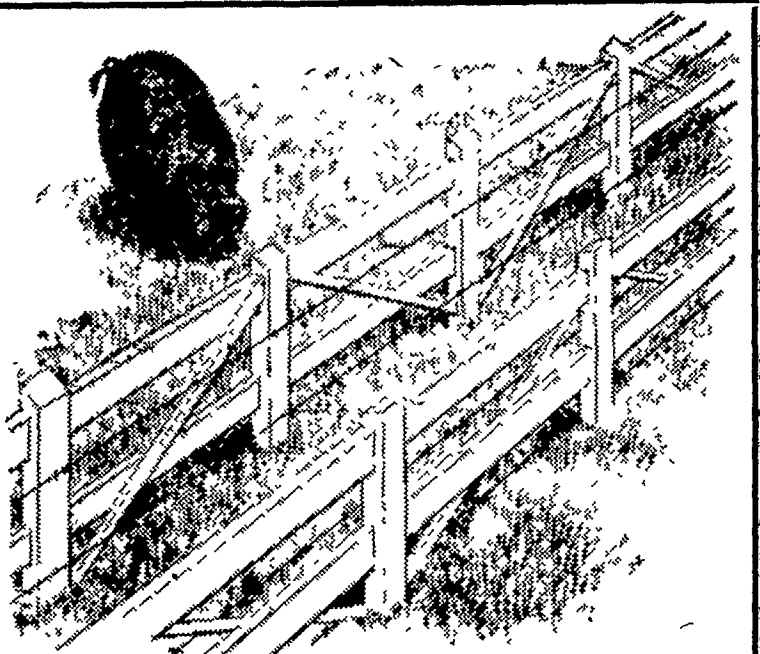
