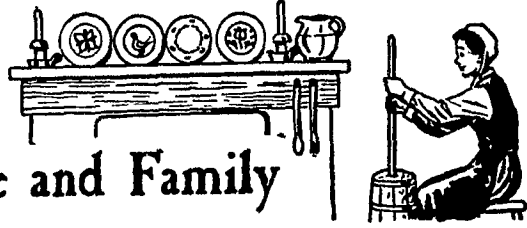

If your family like fritters they will certainly go for Rhubarb Fritters. Mrs. Amos L. Keener, R1 Lititz sends us this recipe as well as one for Rhubarb Batter Pudding.

RHUBARB FRITTERS

Mrs. Amos L. Keener, R1 Lititz
1½ cups flour
2 tablespoons baking powder (scant)
¼ teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons sugar
1 egg
½ cup milk
1 cup finely diced rhubarb

Mix ingredients and beat two minutes. Drop tablespoons of batter into deep hot fat. Fry until well browned. Serve sprinkled with confectioners sugar.

RHUBARB BATTER PUDDING

Mrs. Amos L. Keener, R1 Lititz
Cut into short lengths enough red rhubarb to make one pint, add one cupful plumped raisins, one cupful of sugar and one-fourth teaspoon of ground nutmeg or cinnamon. Mix fruit, sugar and spices together and put into buttered baking dish. Make batter as follows:

½ cup milk
2 eggs
1 tablespoon butter melted
3 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1½ cups flour
Mix in usual way and pour over fruit mixtures. Serve with orange or lemon sauce or cream. Plump seedless raisins in wire strainer over boiling water in covered kettle.

RHUBARB CRUNCH

1 cup sifted flour
¾ cup uncooked oatmeal
1 cup brown sugar
½ cup melted butter
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Make into crumbs. Press one-half of the crumbs in 9-inch bak-

1 cup sugar
2 tablespoon cornstarch
1 cup water
1 teaspoon vanilla

RHUBARB CUSTARD PIE

3 cups rhubarb cut in inch pieces
1½ cups sugar
3 tablespoons flour
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons milk
2 eggs

Beat eggs, add sugar, salt, nutmeg, flour and milk. Beat well and add rhubarb. Turn into a piepan lined with a good rich pie crust. Dot with butter, cover with crust, latticed. Bake at 425 degrees for about 25 minutes.

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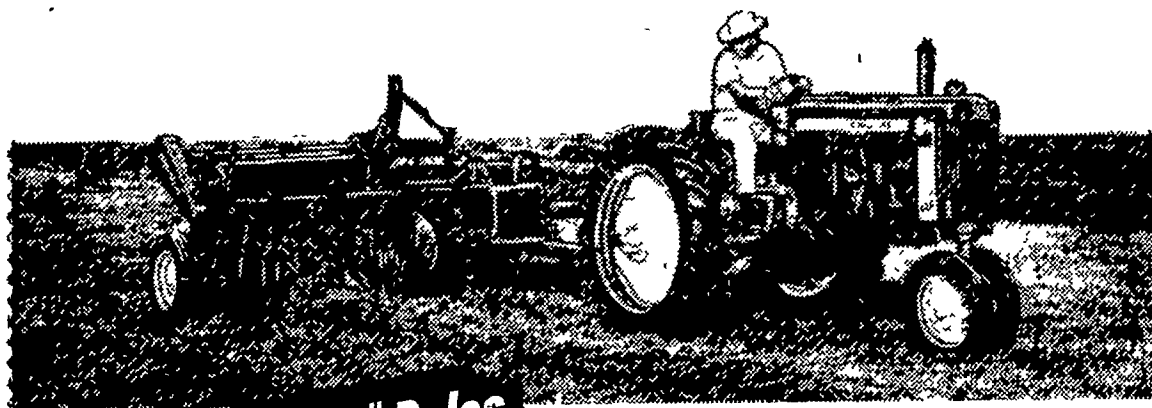
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
