

## Broilers Average 22.75 Cents At Lancaster Exchange Wednesday

LANCASTER — A small sale with only 30,450 birds in 14 lots produced an average of about 21¼ cents at the Lancaster Poultry Exchange Wednesday. The range was from 21¼ to 22 cents with eight lots of birds being sold at the 21¼ cent figure. Three lots sold for 22 cents. A lot of capettes sold for 25½ cents.

There are approximately 100,000 birds listed for the sale today.

LANCASTER — A lot of 300 eleven week old broilers topped the Friday sale of the Lancaster Poultry Exchange by being bid in at 24 cents.

And 84,800 broilers averaged 22.38 cents as the price stayed up from previous lows for the

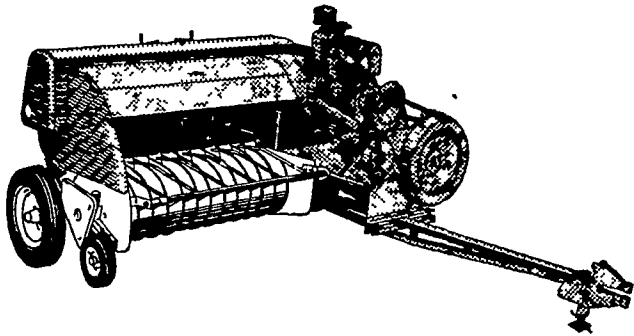

In addition to the broilers four lots of capettes, 3,700 birds, sold for 22½ cents to 28 cents, two lots of Leghorn fowl, 875 in all, sold for 12½ cents and 13½ cents, and a lot of 150 Leghorn cockerels moved for 9½ cents.

A year ago 166,350 broilers averaged 19.65 cents at two sales and in 1955 the average was 28.15 cents for 163,965 broilers.

## Lancaster Markets: Supply Gains 10 Per Cent; Mostly Stockers

LANCASTER—CATTLE: 4,173 week ago 3,698. Stocker and feeder steers accounted for the slightly more than 10 per cent increase in supply for the three day period this week. The offering of slaughter steers was slightly smaller than a week ago. Slaughter steers and heifers compared with last Wednesday now mostly steady, cows steady to 25 cents lower with the decline on beef type cows. Stockers and feeders are steady to weak. Receipts comprised around 40 per cent stockers and feeders and 10 per cent cows.

Bulk choice fed steers 1,000-1,300 lbs. \$23-24.25, high choice and mixed high choice and low prime \$24.50-25.50, a part load 1,180 lb. mostly prime steers \$25.75. Good and low choice fed steers \$20.50-22.75 and some utility and low good \$18.50-20.25. A few good and low choice heifers \$19.50-21.60. Bulk cutter, utility and commercial cows \$13.50-16.75, canners and low cutters mostly \$11-13. Utility and commercial bulls \$17.50-20, odd head weighty Holsteins to \$20.50, good fed yearling bulls \$20-21. Bulk good grade stocker and feeder steers and light yearlings 485-900 lbs. \$21.50-23.50, a few to \$24. Several lots partly fattened two-way steers 950-1,100 lbs. went for fur-

ther feeding from \$22-23.25.

CALVES: 833, week ago 871. Veal calves mostly steady with last Wednesday. Best action on 100-150 lb. good and choice vealers. Bulk good and choice \$22.50-29, odd head prime to \$30, utility and standard \$15-22.

HOGS: 1,721, week ago 1,854. Compared with last Wednesday barrows and gilts around 25-50 cents lower. Sows scarce, about steady. Bulk barrows and gilts mixed US 1-3, 190-230 lbs. in Wednesday's market \$21-21.50, a

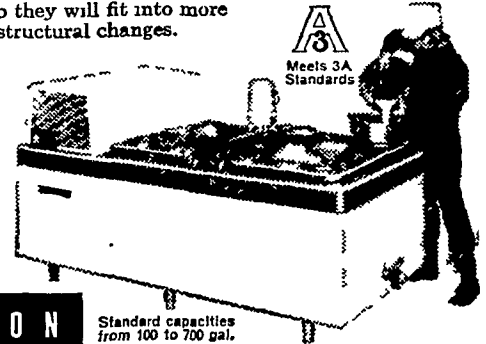

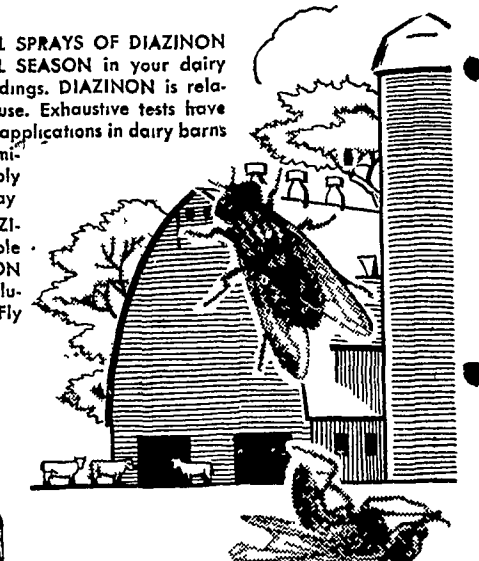
