### Miss Milkmaid Gives Governor Dairy Relic

HARRISBURG — Miss Sandra Dian Shannon, 17-year-old Mercer County farm daughter, from RD2 New Wilmington, and Pennsylvania's 1957 'Miss Milkmaid' participated in special June 15 Dairy Month Ceremonies with Governor George M. Leader of Pennsylvania, commemorating 350 years of dairy industry service to the nation.

Returning from Jamestown, Pa., where she participated in a national "dairy - industry - birthday - party" Miss Shannon presented the Governor with an earthenware milk-pan, over 350 years old and originally brought over by the first English settlers to arrive at James Point, Va. The milk-pan was loaned to the Pennsylvania State Capital Museum for June Dairy Month by the Colonial Historical Park, Williamsburg, Va., and will be on display in the capital museum throughout June Dairy Month.

The Governor also received an authentic reproduction of a table-setting, including a 350-year-old milk jug, milk-pan and two milk-cups, produced by the Williamsburg Pottery Factory especially for the Pennsylvania June Dairy Month event.

Miss Shannon is currently touring Pennsylvania on a personal appearance schedule at various June Dairy Month events. This fall she will represent Pennsylvania at the International - Dairy Exposition in Chicago where she will compete for the American Dairy Association's title of "American Dairy Princess."

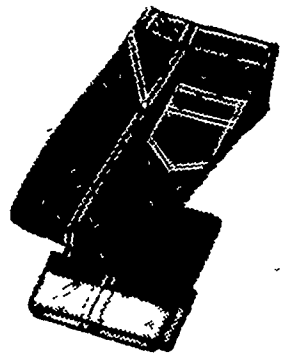

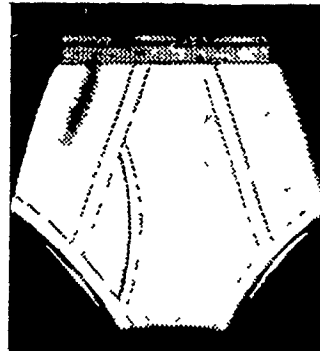
