The milk-pan was loaned to the Pennsylvania State Capital Museum for June Dairy Month by the Colonial Historical Paik, Williamsburg, Va., and will be on display in the capital museum throughout June Dairy Month.

The Governor also received an authentic reproduction of a tablesetting, including a 350-year-old milk jug, milk-pan and two milkcups, produced by the Williamsburg Pottery Factory especially for the Pennsylvania June Dairy Month event.

Miss Shannon is currently touring Pennsylvania on a personal appearance schedule at various June Dairy Month events. 
