

Broiler Price Steady at 21.5 Cents At Lancaster Exchange Friday

LANCASTER — A total of 104,550 broilers sold for an average price of 21.50 cents at the Lancaster Poultry Exchange Friday. The price range was from 20.50 to 22.50 cents.

This price compares with a 21.33 cent average paid for 72,275 broilers a year ago.

In addition to the broilers, a lot of 400 fowl sold for 19 cents; a lot of 200 males sold for 11½ cents, two lots, 900 Leghorns, sold for 12½ cents, and four lots, 4,300 capettes, sold from 22½ to 25½ cents.

Lancaster Markets: Demand Good; Fed Steers Sell at \$.50 Higher

LANCASTER—CATTLE; 3,208 week ago, 3,717. Demand was good for the smaller offering of fed steers and heifers this week. Prices were strong to 50 cents higher than last week's close except on standard to low choice; those mostly steady. Cows steady, bulls fully steady. Stockers and feeders slow steady to weak.

Supplies comprised around 35 per cent stockers and feeders and 12 per cent cows.

The slaughter steer offering graded mostly good and choice and average weights largely 1,250 lbs. and lighter. Bulk choice fed steers 1,000-1,300 lbs. \$23.25-24.25; high choice and mixed high choice and prime \$24.50-25.50, two loads prime 1,200 lb. steers \$26 and \$26.25. Good and low choice steers \$21-22.75, some

standard and low good \$19-20.50. Small lots good and low choice heifers \$19.50-21.50, load 800 lb. average choice heifers \$22.75. Bulk cutter, utility and commercial cows \$13.25-16.25, canners and low cutters, \$11-13. Utility and commercial bulls \$18.50-20.50, good fed yearling bulls to \$21.50. Bulk medium and good 485-850 lb. stocker and feeder steers and light yearlings \$20.50-22.50. Common stock steers down to \$18. Load 1,150 lb. partly fattened two-way steers for further feeding at \$23.50.

CALVES: 929, week ago 900. Demand poor for veal calves, prices \$2.-3. lower than last Wednesday. Late sales veal calves good and choice \$20-24, a few head \$25, utility and standard \$14-19.50.

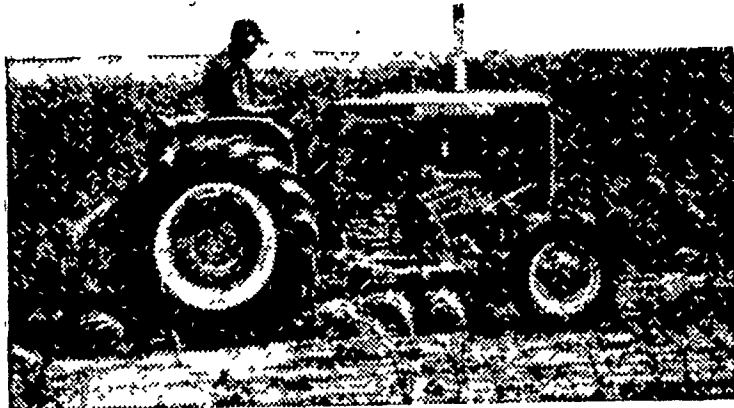
