Care Is Urged In Cleaning **Spring Equipment**

Extreme care in the method and place to clean equipment. used in spraying fields and orchards is urged by the Pennsylvania Department of Health

Recent complaints of stream pollution were traced to the practice of washing the equip. ment near a stream and dumping the residue into the stream or water shed, stated Robert Eppley, sanitary engineer, Regional Office, Reading, Pennsylvania.

It is pointed out by the Clean, Streams Law and those responsible for the pollution and any damage that may be caused to fish or aquatic life can be penalized. A shallow ditch should be dug and the waste water builed The

owner also has other plans for it ditch should not be near any stream or water shed and not deep so as to affect underground water sources.



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
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
