#### Late Summer **Renovation Time**

There is no need to "put up" with poor pastures that are not paying their way. Good pastures should produce two and one-half to three tons of dried forage per acre and milk yields of 6,000 to 8,000 pounds.

July to September is a good time to remove that old unproductive sod and replace it with a new highly productive pasture. John B Washko, professor of agronomy at Pennsylvania State University, says four steps are needed. (1) Destruction of poor vegetation, (2) Application of lime and fertilizer to raise the fertility level of the soil, (3) Selection and seeding of legumegrass mixtures adapted to soil conditions and management used, and (4) Proper management of new pastures.
