Landisville, the two recommended winter oats varieties, DuBois and LeConte, still showed up the best.

Wong and Kenbar barley also continues their lead as the best adapted barley for Pennsylvania.

According to Robert Pfeifer of Penn State, several new wheats from the State of Washington, stiff strawed and high yielding, will be started in a breeding program this fall. However it will take several years breeding and testing for any concrete results to be noticed.

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NEW YORK July 31—Shell egg market unsettled and weaker this morning with broadened selling pressure on variable accumulations. General trade quieter and yesterdays call support withdrawn today. Prices generally down 1/2 cents on nearbys with Midwestern fancies holding up on mixed and only fractionally off on white and browns.

18 Pct. Fewer Young Chickens on Farms

Latest Crop Reporting Board figures estimate that the number of young chickens raised on farms at 394,305,000, which is 18 per cent less than last year and the lowest number on record.

This is a preliminary estimate based on reports as of June 1 from all parts of the country. Indications are that many farmers who raised chickens last year are raising none this year.

The decrease in the number raised this year is greatest in the small flocks where many farmers have decided to liquidate their flocks.

PHILADELPHIA — July 31 — Processed poultry, ready-to-cook (ice packed) young chickens — about steady. More than sufficient supplies were available for the fair demand.

Prices paid delivered warehouse, Philadelphia (cents per lb) Grade A & U.S. grade A, 2-3 lb 36-39, mostly 36-37.

Hens, ready-to-cook (ice packed) steady to firm. Demand improved, especially for heavy type. Offerings were relatively lighter. Prices paid delivered warehouse, Philadelphia (cents per lb.) grade A & U.S. grade A 4-5 1/2 lb. 32-33.

Receipts July 30 included other than turkeys Maryland 75,000 lbs., Delaware 100,000 lbs., Georgia 28,000 lbs., Virginia 21,000 lbs., North Carolina 25,000 lbs.

Some 160-180 lbs. mixed grade \$21.50-22.50. Sows mixed US 13, 270-550 lbs. \$14-17.50.

PHILADELPHIA — July 31 — Unsettled. Prices declined on most grades. Supplies were generally adequate in volume. Demand was lighter and sellers desired quick movement of floor stocks. Out-of-storage movement was moderate in volume.

Wholesale selling prices: minimum 10 per cent AA quality, large, 45-48 lb; white, 47-49; brown, 47-48; medium white, 40-41; brown, 40-41. Extras, minimum 60 per cent A quality. Large 45-50 cents lb; white 41 1/2-42 1/2; mixed, 41-42 1/2; medium white, 38-39; mixed, 37-38. Standards 30-31; checks 23-24.

Prices to retailers in cartons (cents per dozen). Grade A & U.S. Gr. A, large, whites 58-62, mostly 58-60, browns 58-62, mostly 58-60; grade A & U.S. Gr.
