To Demonstrate Tomato Care

A series of meetings at four county tomato growers operations is scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday by Associate County Agent Harry S. Sloat to give growers and pickers training in culture, picking, grading and handling of tomatoes.

The farm at which the first session is to be held is operated by C. H. Reinholds, R3 Lancaster. It is located on Route 230 about two miles east of Lancaster. The session will begin at 9:30 a.m.

The next meeting will be at 6:30 that evening at the farm of James Zimmerman, R1 Stevens, located between Ephrata and Reamstown, half a mile north of Green Dragon Market.

Zimmerman raises Rutgers and Queen tomatoes under irrigation.

The next day (Thursday) the morning meeting will be at the Jay Garber Farm, R6 Lancaster, located two miles south of New Danville. Garber is growing Hybrids 135 and 146 which show good growth and a good set of fruit.

The evening session will be at the farm of Elias Musser, R1, Mt. Joy, located a mile southeast of Florin.

Sloat urges growers to attend, bring their pickers and sharp color vision.

He says that the recent hot dry weather has caused blossom drop and poor set in the tomato crop. The uneven moisture conditions have also caused blossom end rot.

"The last four to six days before picking are critical in the tomato," Sloat says. "The starch turns to sugar, the color turns red, flavor improves and the weight increases rapidly."
