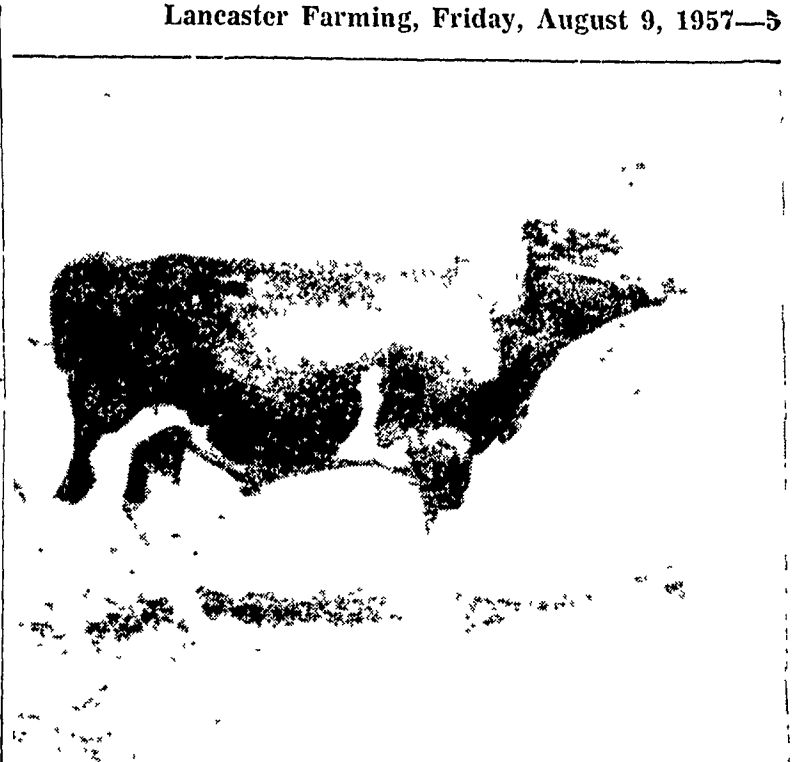

## Frey, Hess Holstein Cows Continue Fight for County Breed Supremacy

Two Holstein cows continued in their fight for breed supremacy in Lancaster County at the SPABC show and the District Black and White Show held Thursday and Friday at the SPABC grounds at Lancaster.

The two cows, Wye Oak Lauxmont Belle, owned by Elvin Hess, R1 Strasburg, and Wightwick Glenafton Rachel, owned by J. Mowrey Frey & Son, R7 Lancaster, made it a draw as Rachel was grand champion of the ABC show and Belle was Black and White grand champion.

The rivalry of the two seven-year-olds goes back four years when they started dominating the two shows as four-year-olds.

Cuthbert Nairn, Douglasville,

an Ayrshire breeder and dairyman, judged the Black and White show.

Junior champion female was owned by J Mowrey Frey. She was a two year old Lucifer daughter out of Fultonway Marksman Della.

Champion bull was a junior yearling owned by Clarence M. Cornman, R6 Carlisle.

Blue ribbon winners at the Black and White show are eligible for competition at the statewide Black and White show at Harrisburg.

## PSU Holstein Exceeds 200,000 lbs. Of Milk in Lifetime as 13-year-old

Pennsylvania State University's most famous dairy cow has joined the select ranks of registered Holsteins with lifetime records exceeding 200,000 lbs. of milk.

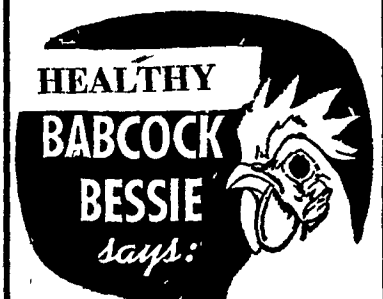
The Holstein-Friesian Association of America reports that the career production of Penstate Inka Pathfinder Star now totals 204,530 lbs of milk and 8,636 lbs. of butterfat.

She ranks as the 66th cow to hit the 200,000 lb milestone eight times the lifetime output of the average dairy animal in the official production testing program of the national Holstein organization.

Thirteen years old and still shining brightly, "Star" is currently tacking more than 55 lbs of milk a day to her whopping lifetime total.

No stranger to the limelight, she has maintained a dazzling pace throughout her long career.

Last year, she carved a permanent niche in breed history as the first Holstein to complete five official records of more than 1,000 lbs of butterfat. Three other registered Holsteins have since duplicated the feat.



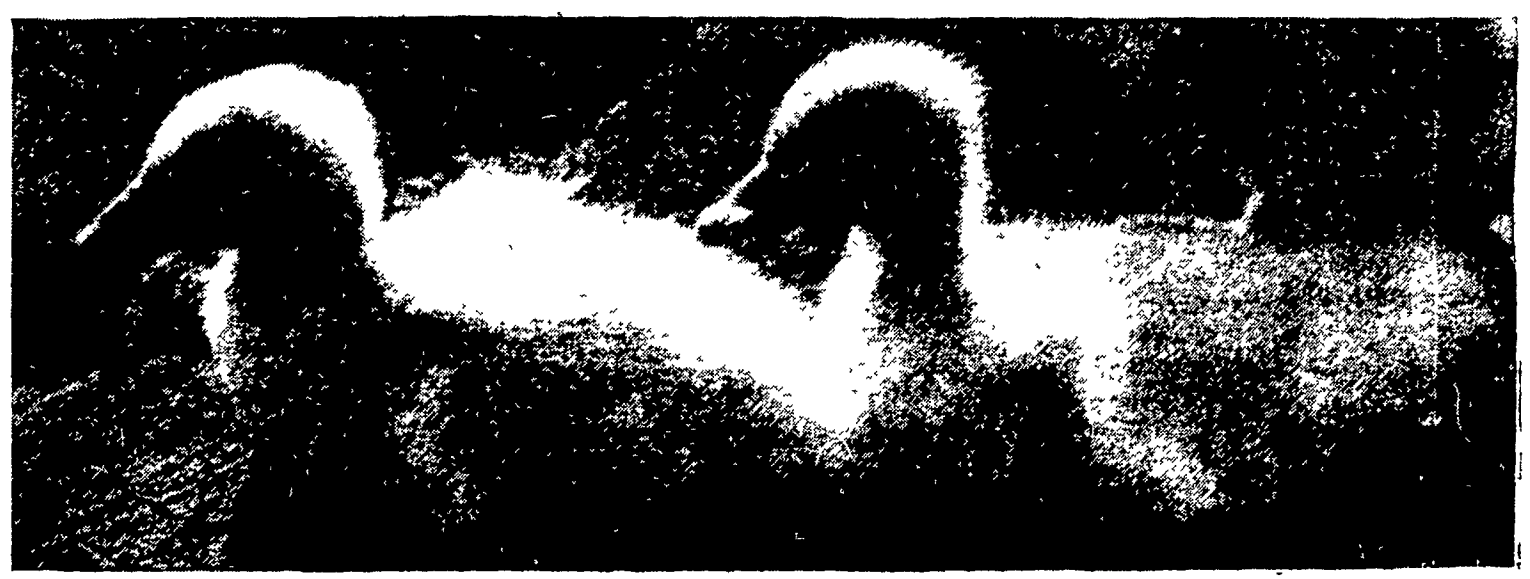
Clean Water Troughs are Important.

Cleans water troughs and fountains at least once a day. This is not to prevent disease. It is to encourage water consumption. Sure, a chicken will drink out of a mud-puddle That tastes good. But water out of a slummy, stinking fountains doesn't taste good. I've seen clean fountains jump production 20 per cent in three weeks time. If you debeat your birds be sure the water is at least two or three inches deep in the fountains and easy to get at.

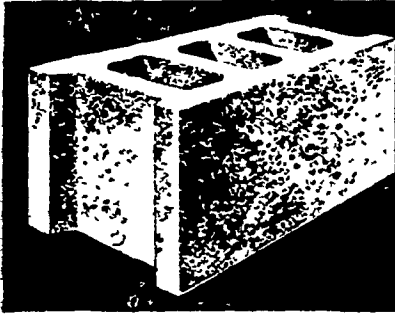
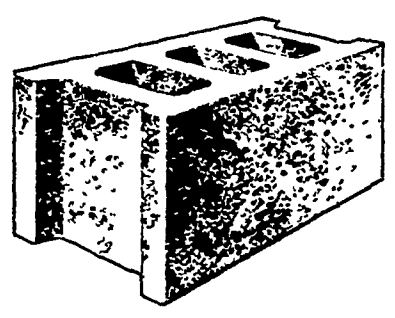
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
