Two Top Holstein Cows Compete At Lampeter Fair; Frey's Champion

The two senior Holstein cows that have been battling it out in the County for breed supremacy met again this past week at the West Lampeter Community Fair. And this time Wightwick Glenafon Rachel, owned by J Mowery Frey Jr. came out the victor.

Running a close second was Wye Oak Lauumont Belle, owned and shown by Elvin Hess, R1 Strasburg.

Belle was the grand champion at the annual Black and White Show at Lancaster in August. "Rachel" had beaten her the preceding day at the SPABC show. The rivalry goes back four years. Pleased at seeing the cow win the show, Paul Longenecker remarked wryly, "This is one of the best cows I ever produced in my herd and I gave her away."

Actually she was won by Frey a few years ago as a calf present-

ed by the county Holstein Breeders Assn. at the Lampeter Fair as a prize for his work in FFA.

Winning prizes this year at the annual event were Holstein, John Groff, R1 Ronks, son of Mr and Mrs Aaron Groff. The calf is from the herd of Abram Wickenheiser, R2 Mt Joy, and was presented by Donald Eby, association president. Groff is a junior at Lampeter-Strasburg Union High School and is a member of the Garden Spot FFA Chapter.

Ayrshire, Roy Mentzer, R2 New Holland. A calf will be purchased at the Ayrshire State Sale to be held next week and will be given Mentzer at that time. On hand to congratulate him was John Paes, R1 Strasburg, Ayrshire association president. Mentzer is a FFA member at Pequea Valley High School.

Guernsey, Arthur Breneman, R1 Willow Street, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Breneman. The calf from the herd of Francis Kirk, Peach Bottom was presented by Melvin Stoltzfus, association president.

Breneman is also a member of the Garden Spot FFA Chapter at Lampeter-Strasburg. He is a senior, treasurer of the chapter, and a bronze-medal winner in the state FFA dairy judging contest held at Penn State last June.

Winner of the baby beef show was Donald M Herr, son of Mr and Mrs Maurice G Herr, Refton. In addition to winning the grand championship with his Angus calf, he was first in fitting and showmanship.

The reserve championship was taken by Dorothy Groff, R7 Lancaster. She showed a Hereford.

Paul Blune, extension livestock specialist from Pennsylvania State University was judge of the show.

Herr, a pre-veterinary medicine student at Franklin and Marshall College, has been showing baby beeves for seven years. This is his first champion.

Other champions at the Fair were a Jersey calf owned and shown by Lucille Kreider to the grand championship with Tom Halladay having the reserve championship. This was a switch from the preceding week at the Solanco Fair when Halladay got the nod.

In the Guernsey breed the Grand Champion female was shown by B Snavelly Garver, R1 Willow Street and the reserve was shown by John Breneman, R1 Willow Street. Kenneth Young, R1 Mt Joy, had the Grand Champion bull.

Abram Floy, R3 Manheim, swept the Ayrshire show having junior, senior, reserve and Grand Champion in that breed.

The corn sweep stakes were won by John T McKelvey's Sons, R2 Peach Bottom.
