Part of the exhibitor's expenses are shared by the Pennsylvania Guernsey Breeders Assn and the American Guernsey Cattle Club.



Scientists Photograph Virus

SCIENTISTS AT THE Plum Island Animal Disease aboratory of the US Department of Agriculture report that they have purified, isolated, and photographed the foot-andmouth disease virus. Their first electron micrographs of the virus reveal that it is spherical in shape and about onemillionth of an inch in diameter This is the smallest of any of the viruses affecting animals—even smaller than polio virus These new findings about the physical makeup of foot-and-mouth disease virus are expected to speed research on the development of new and effective means of combatting the disease, which has great economic importance to livestock production throughout most of the world.
