## CCC Keeping Bushel Basis In '58 Operations

The US Department of Agriculture's Commodity Stabilization Service said today that it will not shift from the bushel to the hundredweight measure in handling next year's Commodity Credit Corporation operations, but that study and discussion of the desirability of making the change at a later date will be continued.

The possible use of the hundredweight measure at the beginning of the 1958 marketing year as the basis for CCC price support loans, warehouse handling and storage charges, sales, and related activities has been under current consideration. The proposal was discussed with grain trade and farm organization representatives at a special meeting in Washington Sept 25. It was also considered at a national conference of State commissioners and directors of agriculture early this week.

After this discussion, it was decided that it would be advisable to make further determinations regarding both the advantages and the difficulties in the proposed change before undertaking the shift. Among factors considered were the need to be certain that all concerned with grain handling, from producers to ultimate users, had full opportunity to understand just how they would be affected; the minimum timelag required for both CCC and the trade to revise regulations and procedures, and the possible need for legislative revision of laws regarding grain handling in some States.
