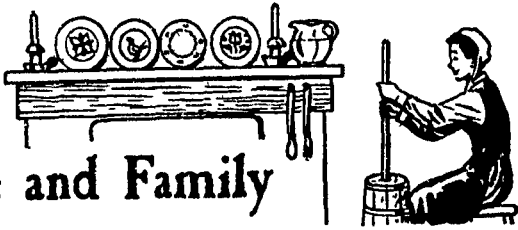

When you're going to the movies with children, a shopping bag can save you a lot of worry. It will hold packages, purses, hats, scarves, and other items likely to be lost.

A button sewed to one corner of the dishcloth helps scrape off stubborn particles of food that have dried on plates or stuck to pans.

Don't let a coat get too soiled before having it cleaned. See your dry cleaner for recommendations.

Heating pads should not be used where there is danger of their getting wet.

Sprinkle fish or lamb with lemon juice a few minutes before cooking to bring out the delicate flavors. The lemon juice also cuts down on odors and helps tender-

ize the meat.

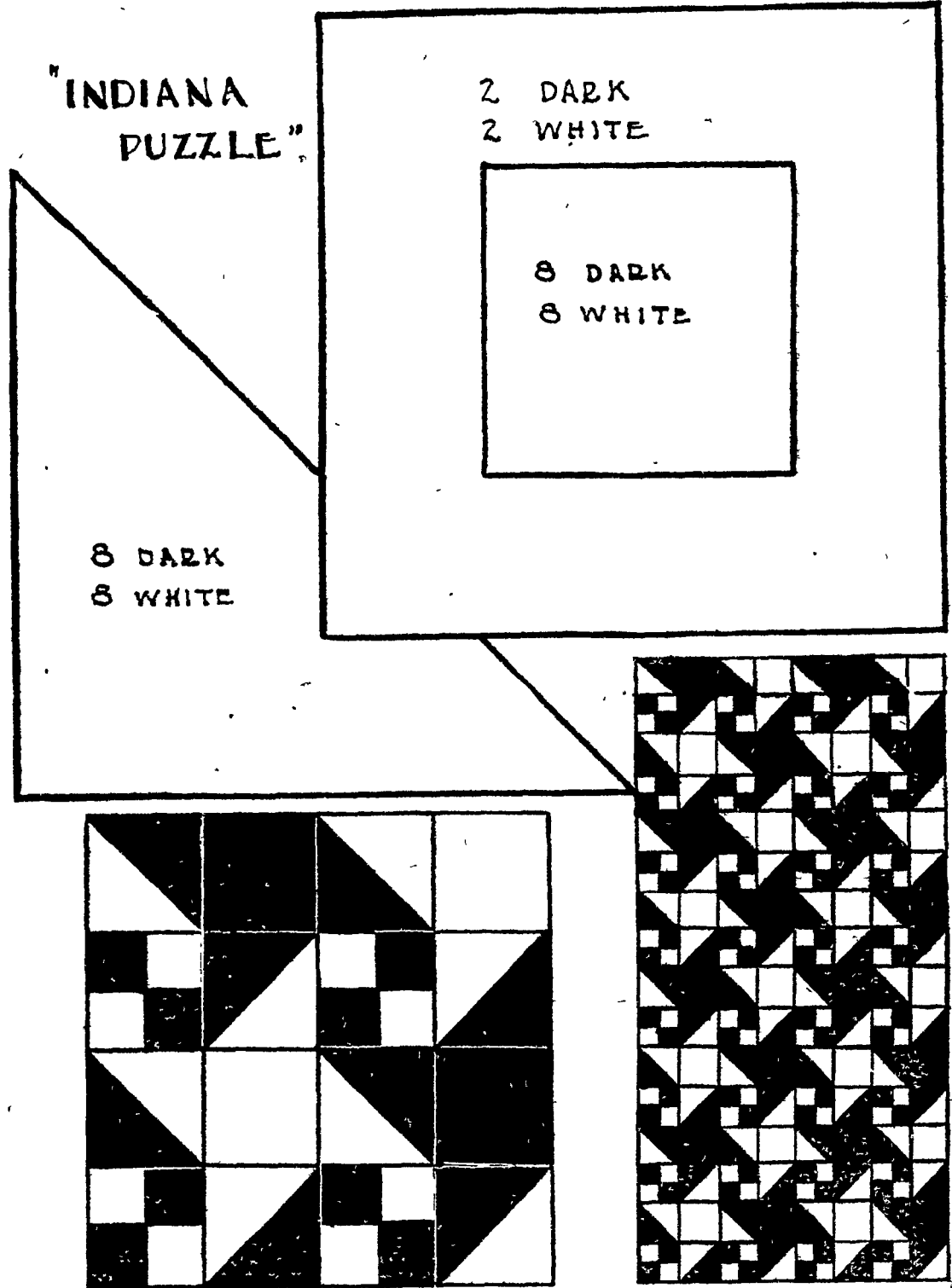

THE BLOCK  
(Chp and Save)

This intricate pattern comes from Indiana. It is remarkably effective, considering the simplicity of the patches, and makes a very striking quilt pieced in dark blue and white. The block, when finished, is sixteen inches square. This pattern will arouse the interest of quilt makers who get their keenest enjoyment out of piecing difficult patterns, as it is considered by many to be more difficult to put together than "The Old-Maid's Puzzle." In piecing it, sew patches together in rows and join rows. No seams are allowed.
