

Swine Semen Preservation Method Proves Successful in Beltsville Tests

A team of seven specialists in swine production and marketing has been sent to Canada by the United States Department of Agriculture to study improved methods of producing and marketing hogs in that country.

The group currently is touring several hog producing Provinces of Canada after meeting with Canadian Department of Agriculture officials in Ottawa.

The study is part of the practice of exchanging technical in-

formation long observed by United States and Canadian agriculture.

The mission to Canada resulted from concern by hog producers in the U. S. and recognition by the U. S. Congress and the Department of Agriculture of problems in producing and marketing hogs in this country. American consumers have been changing their preferences toward less fat and more meatiness in the pork they would like to buy. At the same

time, progress in the United States toward production and marketing of meat-type hogs has been relatively slow.

Study of Canadian methods and procedures was undertaken in accordance with recommendations of the House Committee on Agricultural Appropriations. Meatier type hogs have long been produced in Canada. An important reason for this, pointed out in the House Committee report, is that for several decades Canadian pro-

ducers have received higher prices for production of high quality meat-type hogs. It is hoped that observation of Canadian production and marketing techniques will reveal features of their program that might be adaptable to production and marketing conditions in the United States.

Meat-type hogs have been successfully developed by agricultural scientists in this country. Closer coordination of research and service work on hogs will be

fostered by the United States Department of Agriculture to facilitate more widespread use of meat-type breeding stock by the American swine industry.

The team of specialists from the United States, headed by Gerald Engelman of the Department's Agricultural Marketing Service, will spend about two weeks in Canada. The group is expected to give particular attention to grading and marketing methods in Canada, to the effects of these methods on characteristics of pork production, and to the methods and techniques used for swine improvement in Canada.
