Indiana Hereford International Grand Champion Steer; Brings \$30

In the sheep show, entries from Green Meadows Farms, Bateville, took all the honors in the Hampshire breeding class. They showed grand champion ram, ewe, and flock. This repeated similar sweep made in the breeding classes at the Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition last month. Green Meadows is owned and operated by Edward and Arthur Hess.

Penn State herdsman were pleased with the showing of their first prize junior bull calf which became the first Polled Hereford bull ever to win the American Polled Hereford Assn registry of merit award at the International P S Polled Zato previously had won the reserve grand championship at the Pennsylvania National and first place at the Eastern National at Timonium, Md.

Shorthorn beef cattle shown by the University garnered second places in three classes—two year old bull, summer yearling bull and senior yearling heifer. They also won fourth in trio of steers, any age, and fifth in senior steer calves.

In sheep classes the University had the grand champion pen of three Hampshire wethers, also third and fourth in individual Hampshire wethers. Shropshires had the third in pen of heavy wethers and Southdown awards included third place heavy wether and fourth best pen of wethers. In sheep breeding classes the University won seconds in pen of rams and pen of ewe lambs and fourths in ram lambs and ewe lambs.

Millarden Farms, Annville, this year again dominated the Angus breeding classes having a first place summer yearling bull and a champion female. The Grand Championship in the Angus bull division was taken by Tolan Farms, Pleasant Plains, Ill.

Dean Arthur D. Weber of Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kans., judged the steer classes. Judge of the wether classes was Dr. A. J. Dyer of the University of Missouri.

In addition to more than 5,000 spectators, Gov. Harold W. Hanley of Indiana was on hand to see the grand champion steer picked.



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
