

10 Boys, FFA and 4-H Members, To Compete in Driving Contest

HARRISBURG — As all types of farm tractors and other machines continued moving into the Farm Show Building, the Farm Show Commission announced that ten farm boys will compete in a demonstration of skills and safety in the operation of farm tractors.

There will be two separate contests one between five members of the Future Farmers of America age 16 to 21 and the other between five members of 4-H Clubs in the same age group. In each division the awards will be \$25 for first place, \$15 for second, and \$10 for third, fourth, and fifth places.

Entries for each division the commission reported, have been chosen by elimination. Each contestant will be required to demonstrate proficiency in spotting the drawbar, handling the equipment, and belting up. Scoring will be by the points off system, and the contestant with the low score wins.

The five FFA boys who will participate are Lamar Hager, Pennridge Joint High School, Bucks County; Hawley Travis, Lookville Borough H S, Jefferson County; David Mankamyer,

Berlin-Brothersvalley Joint H S, Somerset County; Fred Wilcox, Ti County Joint H S, Canton, Bradford County; and Robert Landis, Lampeter - Strasburg Union H S, Lancaster County.

Competing as 4-H Club members will be David Groff West Clove, Chester County; James Crawford, Tyrone, Blair County; Larry Lauback, Benton, Columbia County; Wayne Heebner, Norristown, Montgomery County; and William Altemose, Kunkletown, Monroe County. Alternates are Lawrence Mills, York, and Lowell Friedline, Boswell, Somerset County. The winner will represent Pennsylvania in the Eastern United States 4-H Tractor Operators Contest in Richmond, Va., early next fall.

The tractor driving contest will be held at 5 p. m. on Thursday of Farm Show week in the large arena. The Farm Show Commission will supply wheel-type, rubber-tired tractors for the contest and, if possible, will arrange for the make, model and type with which the contestant is familiar.
