Prices on barrows and gilts mainly \$1.00 higher, sows 25-50 cents up. U. S. 1-3, 180-230 lb butchers brought \$20.25-20.50 with the latter price paid freely, a few to \$20.75; 230-270 lb \$19.50-20.25. U. S. 1-3, 300-400 lb sows \$16.00-16.25, a limited number under 300 lb up to \$16.75 and a few around 500 lbs \$15.25-15.50. Board all weights \$11.50-12.00.

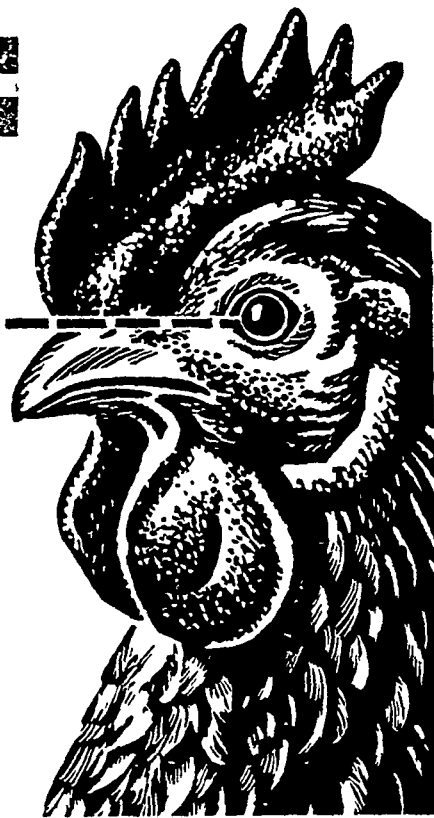

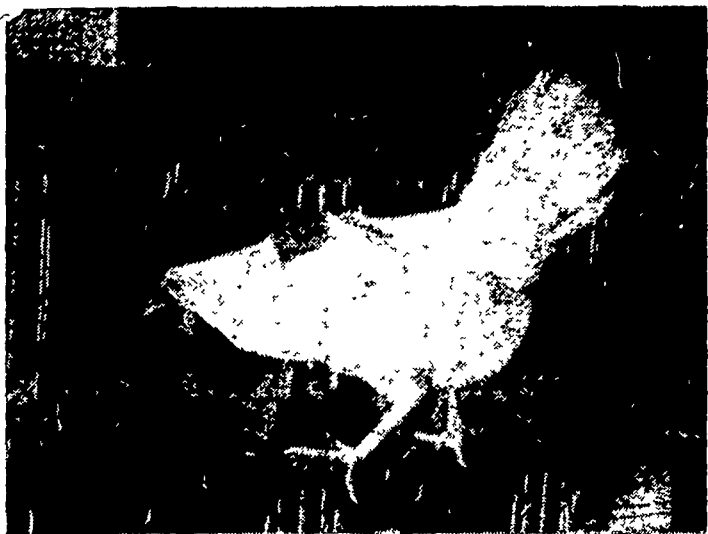
