

Dr. Henning Praises Farm Women For Entries of Food, Clothing

HARRISBURG, Jan. 13 — From the quality of homemaking displays entered in the 1758 Pennsylvania Farm Show, farm women have more than done their share in making the exposition a consumer's show, State Secretary of Agriculture William L. Henning declared.

"Sputniks and guided missiles may be sailing overhead but home baking, canning foods and making clothing goes on as usual on the farm," he told the opening sessions of the Society of Farm Women of Pennsylvania.

Events at the Farm Show give ample proof that farm mothers have little trouble with juvenile delinquency, he added.

"Instead of driving 'hot rods' over the highways, more and more of our Pennsylvania farm boys and girls have taken to riding light horses for exercise and diversion," Henning said. "The

Farm Show paid tribute to this growing movement by having 4-H pony and light horse clubs demonstrate their abilities in drills and contests Thursday night in the large arena.

The State agriculture chief also declared that farm women should continue their interest in public education because agriculture, as well as industry, will need a continuing supply of scientists. Exceptional students who have the desire to continue in agriculture will find plenty of opportunity in agricultural research, extension and in fields allied to farming, he emphasized.

Farm women were complimented by Henning on the quality of canned and baked goods and clothing exhibits at the Farm Show. Home canning has not become a "lost art" on Pennsylvania farms when the women and our homemaking students and 4-H Club members provide such a high type of exhibits that are now on display at the Farm Show, he declared.

"The 1958 Farm Show is a consumer show," Henning continued. "It is dedicated to better farming for better service to consumers." He urged all members of the farm women's organization to visit the consumer display at the Pennsylvania State University on the main floor at the Farm Show.

Christmas Trees To Bring Lower Wholesale Prices

Harrisburg, Jan. 13 — Commercial Christmas tree growers were told to prepare for a cut in prices at wholesale levels in 1958. J. B. Althouse of the Federal-State Crop Reporting Service, made his prediction during a Farm Show meeting here.

Althouse, who was in charge of a recently completed statewide survey of Christmas tree growers to determine marketing habits and average prices, attributed the price slash for 1958 trees to retail price cutting last year when many trees were unsold near Christmas.

Nearly 93 per cent of the 2,600 Christmas tree growers queried on the survey contributed information, Althouse said. Of this number about 95 per cent could be classed as a "commercial grower."

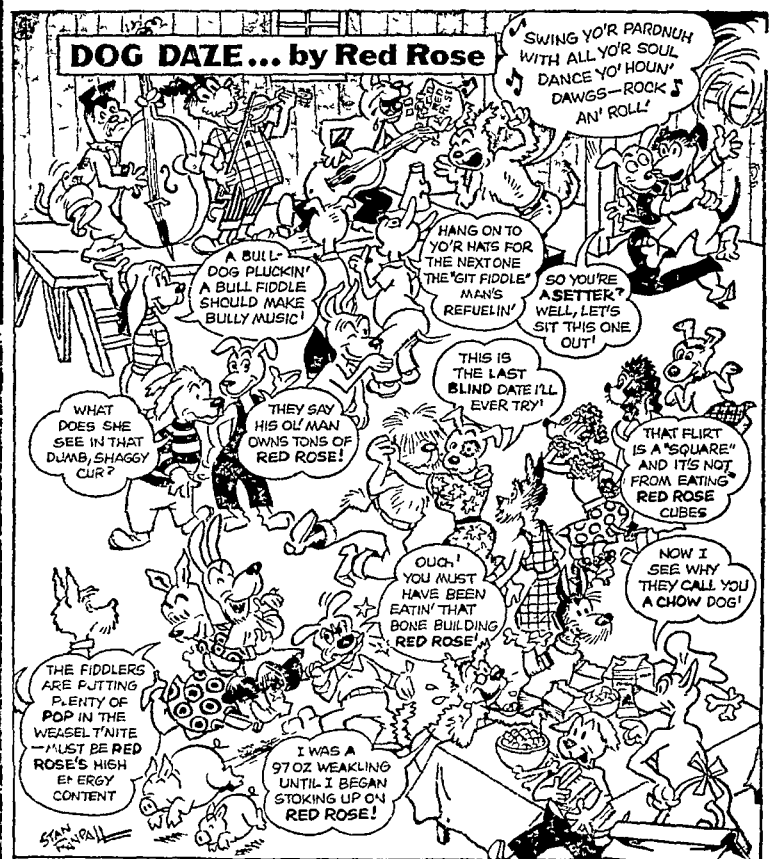
