Cattle Prices Steady, Hogs Drop at Baltimore

BALTIMORE, Jan 27 — CATTLE Slaughter steers made up approximately 60 per cent of the supplies, with good and choice grades predominating, quality of the bulk on offer a little lower than recent. Mondays Heifers made around 10 per cent, balance mostly cows and vealers.
Good and choice 950-1200 lb fed steers brought 25 50-26 75, a few \$27 00, choice lots \$27 00-27 50, 13 head choice 1050-1100 lb steers cashed at \$28 00. Standard and good steers sold from \$22 00-25 50. Standard to mostly good 700-900 lb heifers realized \$23 00-24 00, lot good carrying choice and brought \$25 50. Culler to commercial cows sold from \$15 50-19 00, few commercial and standard at \$20 00, canners and cutters \$13 00-16 00. Bulk utility and commercial bulls brought \$19 00-21 00. Good and vealers sold from \$32 00-36 00, few choice \$37 00, standard and good \$25 00-32 00. Few standard to good slaughter calves moved from \$19 00-23 00. A limited number medium and good feeder steers brought \$22 50-24 25 and a lot of good and choice 400 lb stocker steer calves sold at \$26 00.
HOGS Bulk of supplies were 180-240 lb barrows and gilts in mixed lots, few scarce. Trading moderately active with prices for butchers 75 cents lower, sows nominally steady. Mixed U S No 1-3, 180-230 lb barrows and gilts sold from \$20 75-21 25 with \$21 00 paid rather freely, lots selling at \$21 25 were mainly No 1-2 grades. Mixed 230-250 lb butchers \$20 00-20 75, few No 2-3, 260-270 lbs \$19 25, lot weighing 280-290 lb at \$18 50. U S 1-3, 300-400 lb sows \$16.25-17 00, a few under 300 lbs up to \$17 50.

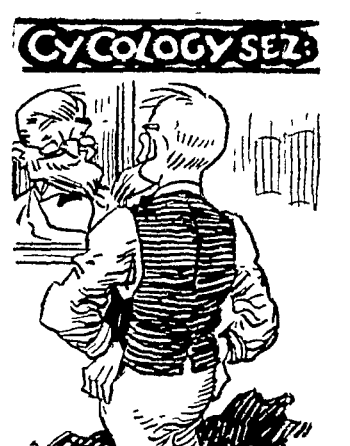
