## Baltimore Market

### Reports Cattle Active, Steady

BALTIMORE, March 10 — CATTLE AND CALVES Around 50 per cent of the supply was made up of fed steers and about 5 per cent fed heifers, these mostly good grades with only moderate showing of choice standard steers, showed a noticeable increase in the supply. About 30 per cent cows and 15 per cent stockers and feeders made up the balance. Trading opened slow on all classes. Slaughter steers and heifers were fully steady. Cows were moderately active later and sold 25 cents higher with instances of 50 cents up on cutters. Bulls were steady. Bulk average good to average choice, 900-1150 lb fed steers \$26.00-28.00. Few lots, mostly average to high choice, \$28.00-28.65. Two lots, 1200-1250 lbs included at \$26.00 and \$28.00. One lot high choice to low prime 977 lbs at \$30.50, individual 970 lbs \$31.00. Standard and low good \$24.00-26.00. Two small lots low to average choice 750-964 lb fed heifers \$25.50-26.25, small lots standard and good \$23.00-24.00. Good and low choice \$24.00-25.50. Utility and commercial cows sold mostly from \$16.25-18.50, high commercial and standard \$19.00-22.00, canners and cutter \$14.00-16.50 with light anners down to \$13.00. Utility and commercial bulls mostly \$19.00-22.00, an individual \$22.25. Choice 170-230 lb vealers \$29.00-32.00. Good \$26.00-29.00, standard mostly \$23.00-26.00. Two sizeable lots around 900-1000 lb good and choice feeder steers \$25.25-26.50. Small lots good 579-601 lb stock steers \$24.00-24.25. Small lots 513 lb medium \$21.00. Small lots good and choice 328 lb stock steer

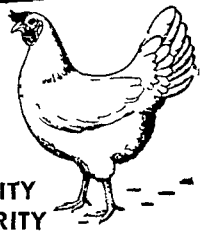

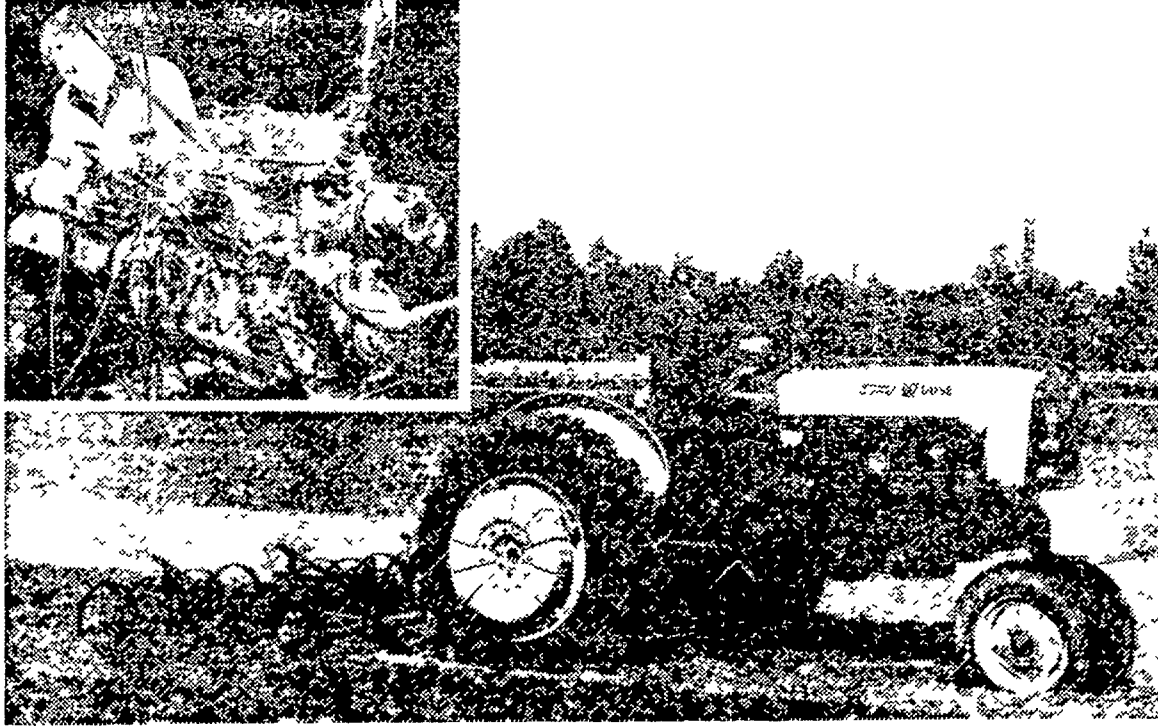
