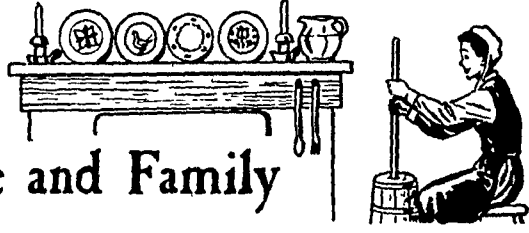

pound canned hams much like the larger six- to eight-pound canned hams now on the market.

Small canned hams, many of

them imported, have been on the market previously. These hams have fully processed at a fairly high temperature. Although this allowed them to be stored at room temperature, it also resulted in a large amount of free liquid in the can.

To avoid this problem, a way was found to process the new small canned hams safely at lower temperatures. Like the usual large canned hams, they have good flavor, little excess liquid in the can, and must be stored in the refrigerator.

Production of these hams is just beginning. They should be popular with those who like the convenience of ready-to-serve boneless hams but find the six-pound hams too large.

A homemaker may like to have a small canned ham in the refrigerator for a quick meal. The ham slices most easily when cold. Bank it with homemade potato salad for a buffet supper. Cold or hot, a 1½ pound canned ham should serve four to six people. To save time when serving it hot, remove ham from the can, slice thin, tie slices together with a string, and cover with brown sugar or with pineapple or apricot preserves for a glaze. Or garnish with canned pineapple slices, canned pear or peach halves, or cooked dried prunes. Heat in the over at 325 degrees until the meat is heated through to the center.

- 3 cups water
- 1½ teaspoons salt
- 1 cup milk
- ¼ cup sugar
- Mint flavoring
- Green food coloring
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup whipping cream, chilled
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 2 cups just-thawed raspberries or strawberries

Cook rice. Stir in the milk. Cover and cook over a low heat 10 minutes. Stir occasionally. Stir in the three-fourth cup sugar. Divide the rice mixture into two parts. To one part add the mint flavoring until the desired degree of flavor is obtained. Add green food coloring until a mint green color is obtained. Cover and chill. To serve, whip the cream. Fold in the one tablespoon of sugar. Fold some of the whipped cream into the mint flavored rice mixture and some of the whipped cream into the vanilla rice mixture. Save some whipped cream for topping the dessert. Layer the mint rice, the raspberries (they are especially good) or strawberries, and the vanilla rice in parfait glasses or other dessert dishes. Top with whipped cream.

If parfait glasses (8 oz.) are used, this recipe will make six servings. A good idea is to place a generous amount of the mint rice in the bottom of each parfait glass. Top with some of the berries. Add a generous layer of the vanilla rice and top with more of the berries. Garnish with whipped cream.

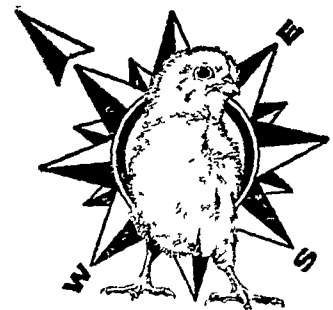

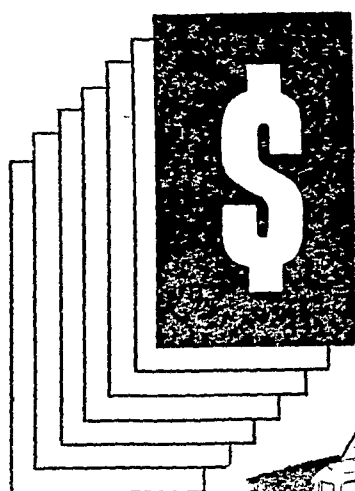

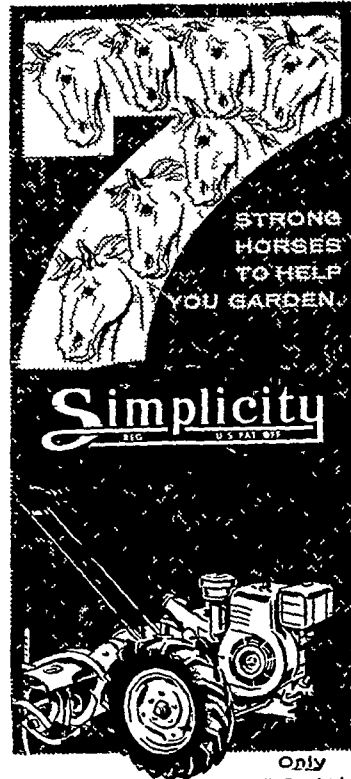
