

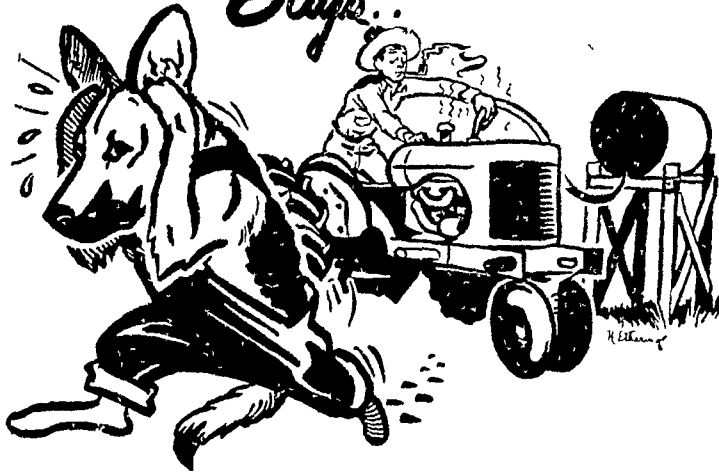

New Teacher Joins Vo-ag Staff At Manheim Central High School

Spring Guernsey Tour to Be Held On April 22

The annual spring tour of the Lancaster County Guernsey Breeders' Assn will be on Tuesday, April 22. The breeders will visit the Lehigh Valley Cooperative at Allentown and Grayce Farms at Scranton.

Robert Y. Moffet, owner of Grayce Farms and William K. Hepburn Jr., farm manager, will show a number of their great animals and conduct a small judging school. They have two World's record Guernsey cows—Haddon's Midda, with a record of 28,787 pounds of milk and 1,235 pounds of butterfat and Fairlawe Actor's Faithful, 23,298 pounds of milk and 911 pounds of butterfat.

Cost per person for the trip will be about \$4. Lunch will be available at the co-operative cafeteria or it may be packed and taken along.

The tour will leave from the Conestoga Bus Terminal, 825 East Chestnut St. at 7:30 a.m., April 22. Wives especially are invited.

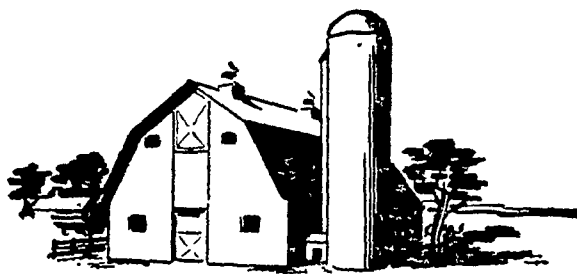
