'Doc' Nixon. Potato Wizard, Honored on 75th

STATE COLLEGE. April 21 -I, celebration of the 75th birth day anniversary of Dr E. L. Nixon, long known as the Pennsylvania "potato wizard," more than 100 of his friends and associates asembled today at his farm west of here

Tribute was paid by agricultural and business leaders to 'Doc' Nixon for his long service to the Pennsylvania agriculture which began in 1917 When he came to Penn State the aver age yield of 275 bushels per acre v as reached in 1956

Nixon founded the Keystone 400 Bushel Potatoe Club in 1918 making any farmer eligible for riembership who could grow 400 c: more bushels on an officially measured acre It is the oldest agr_cultural production club in the United States and now has 1,374 members

In 1922 23 "Doc" Nixon led a compaign among potato growers for erection of the student in f imary at the Pennsylvania State University Later he was instrurental in establishing an experis ental farm for development of r w varieties of potatoes adapted 19 Pennsylvania growing conditens, located at what is now Potato City He originated the Potato Blossom Queen program ad sparked a drive for erection of Potato City Hotel by the Pen 1 ylvania Cooperative Potato Glowers, Inc The glowers built 1.m a greenhouse there for his notato breeding work
