## Stockers Hit \$30; Supply Good At Baltimore

**Federal-State Market News**  
BALTIMORE, April 23 — CATTLE AND CALVES The fed steer supply decreased sharply from recent Mondays with only 25-30 per cent of run comprised of steers. Balance of supply made up of 5 per cent fed heifers and 15-20 per cent cows with fully 50 per cent stockers and feeders. The fed steer and heifer run was largely good and choice grades and stockers and feeders mostly medium and good grades with several choice lots included. Good clearance all slaughter classes. Fed steers and heifers moderately active, steers slightly uneven ranging from weak to strong, but averaging mostly steady. Heifers were steady. Cows were active and sold fully steady to strong with instances 25-50 cents higher. Bulls were scarce and slow, steady. Vealers were scarce and moved slow, but sold fully steady. Stocker and feeder steers and stock steer calves were slow and steady with around 300-400 head still in first hands at 2 p.m. The bulk of 940-1191 lb good to average choice fed steers sold at \$27.00-29.00, load & few small lots average to high choice 851-1150 lbs at \$29.25-30.75, package 1296 lbs included at \$29.50. Half load 1333 lb choice steers \$28.50. Few scattered head and small lots standard and good \$25.00-27.00. Small lot 931 lb high choice fed heifers \$28.00, package 923 lb choice \$27.50, bulk good to low choice 670-713 lbs \$25.00-27.00 with two loads at latter price. Load 625 lb mostly standard heifers \$26.50. Utility and commercial cows \$19.00-21.00, few standard up to \$22.50, canners and cutters mainly \$16.00-19.00 with a few down to \$15.00. Utility and commercial bulls \$2.00-24.00, bulk \$22.00-23.50. Clove 170-230 lb vealers \$32.00-35.00, good \$29.00-32.00 and a few standard \$25.00-29.00. The bulk of 706-853 lb good and choice feeder steers brought \$27.00-30.00, one lot 845 lb common and medium \$24.00. Bulk 516-636 lb good and choice stock steers \$27.50-21.50. Load 612 lb medium \$25.00. A load of 345 lb choice-fancy stock steer calves \$27.00, 2 small lots 354-422 lb choice \$30.00-32.00.

HOGS Butchers were active selling mostly \$25 lower with a few small lots of No 1 and 2 grades steady. Sows were moderately active and steady. The bulk of the supply was mixed lots of U S No 1, 2, and 3, 180-240 lb butchers and these brought \$22.25-22.50 with one lot at \$22.00 and around 50 head No 1 and 2, 195-210 lb \$22.75. A few small lots No 2 and 3 290-300 lbs \$19.00-20.00, 270 lb lot \$21.25. Mixed No 1, 3, 300-400 lb sows \$18.00-18.75. Average cut-out value advantage of U S No 1 over No 3, live basis, 200-220 lb barrows and gilts was \$1.00 per cwt based on wholesale carlot prices of fresh pork cuts at Chicago April 11 to April 17, 1958, inclusive.

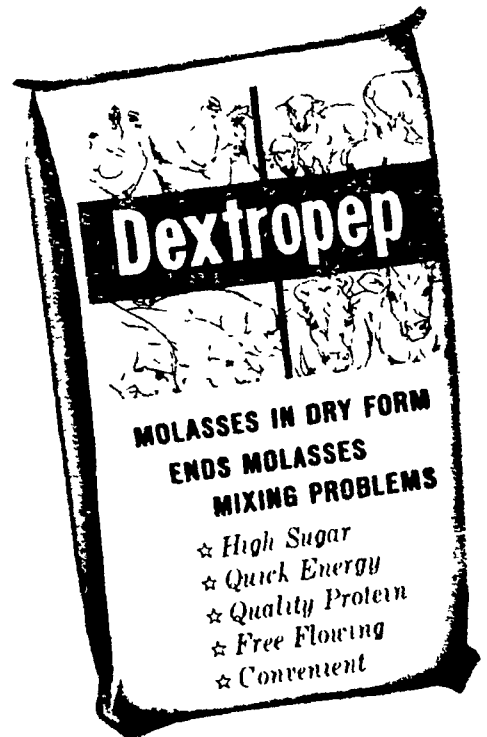
