Latest figures from State ASC offices show that as of April 25, farmers had signed and filed 1,035,781 applications offering a total of 16,962,943 "allotment" acres of wheat, corn, upland cotton, rice and tobacco for the 1958 Acreage Reserve of the Soil Bank.

Statewide the average price for the six auctions was 54.77 cents a pound, 58.13 cents without the low Altoona average. Actual number of lots sold was 605 with a total weight of 29,85 pounds which added a record \$16,161.65 to the combined bank accounts of the 11 to 20-year old contestants. Buyers attending the sales totaled 194.

**Cuba, Short of Corn, Imports from U. S.**

In January and February of this year, Cuba imported about 362,000 bushels of shelled corn from the U.S. and according to the Foreign Agricultural Service, will probably need to import another million bushels between now and next August. The reason for the Cuban corn shortage is reported to be partially due to the rapid growth of the broiler industry in that country.
