PHILADELPHIA, May 14 — Barely steady. Supplies of most grades were more than adequate for the fair immediate demand.

Prices to retailers in cartons (cents per dozen). Grade A and US grade A large: whites 49-53, mostly 50-51; browns 49-53, mostly 50-51. Grade A and US grade A medium: whites 43-47, mostly 44-46, browns 43-47, mostly 44-46.

Grade A and grade A small whites 37-42, mostly 39-41; brown 37-42, mostly 39-41. Grade B and US grade B large 45½-48, mostly 46-48; browns 45½-48, mostly 46-48. Receipts, May 13 — 6,300 cases by truck.

Broiler Prices Recover Quickly From Weakened Week-end Position

PHILADELPHIA, May 13 — With demand faltering across the nation generally, broiler and fryer prices eased in the major producing areas at the beginning of the week.

Week-end sales in the Delmarva area saw the bulk of the birds moving at 21.75 cents a pound. Georgia prices were down a full cent.

By Tuesday the market had regained slightly and the prices remained about steady to slightly higher than a week ago.

The broiler-fryer ratio on May 9 stood at 4:2, up a point from the previous week and four points from two weeks ago. Feed prices were quoted at \$101.90 a ton for 20 per cent broiler mash and the average price was 21.58 cents, about a half cent higher than the week before.

Here is the way the market shaped up in the six major broiler producing areas on Tuesday.

DELMARVA: Market unsettled and quiet. Trading light with most of trading at undetermined prices. Prices paid at the farm were from 22¼ to 22½ cents. Of 71,000 head sold, 24 per cent were at 22¼ cents, 12 per cent at 22½ cents, and the remainder undetermined.

GEORGIA: Demand improved slightly in some instances but continues spotty to mostly fair. Offerings generally ample but slightly irregular a few points. Buyers' offering prices were from 19 to 19½ cents at the farm. Eighty per

cent moved at 19 cents and only nine per cent at the 19½ cent price.

NORTH CAROLINA: Offerings adequate. Demand fair. Prices ranged from 19 to 20 cents. Most sales at 19 cents, slightly fewer at 20 cents.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY: Demand irregular ranging from slow to good. Offerings ample to short in some sections. Prices paid were 20 to 21½ cents. Sales were about evenly split from 20 to 21 to 21½ cents. Heavy hens were quoted at 20 to 22 cents, small hens at 13 cents.

ARKANSAS: Offerings excessive at some points, short at others. Undertone unsettled. Most birds were sold for 20 cents a pound with the bottom at 19 cents.

ALABAMA: Offerings and supplies ample to fully ample. Demand slow to fair, mostly fair. Prices at the farm were steady at 19 cents.

Bulk barrows and gilts mixed U S 1, 2 and 3, 190-230 lbs in Wednesday's trade \$24.25-24.75, several lots No 1 and 2, \$25, about ten head \$25.50. Few 230-250 lbs. No. 2 and 3, \$24-24.50. Sows mixed U S 1, 2 and 3, 300-550 lbs. \$16-19, few under 300 lbs to \$19.50.

SHEEP 402, week ago 459. Supply mainly native and Virginia spring slaughter lambs, these grading mostly good and choice. Slaughter lambs steady and choice 60-80 lb spring lambs with last Wednesday. Bulk good \$26-28, few utility down to \$24.00. Aged sheep too scarce for a market test.

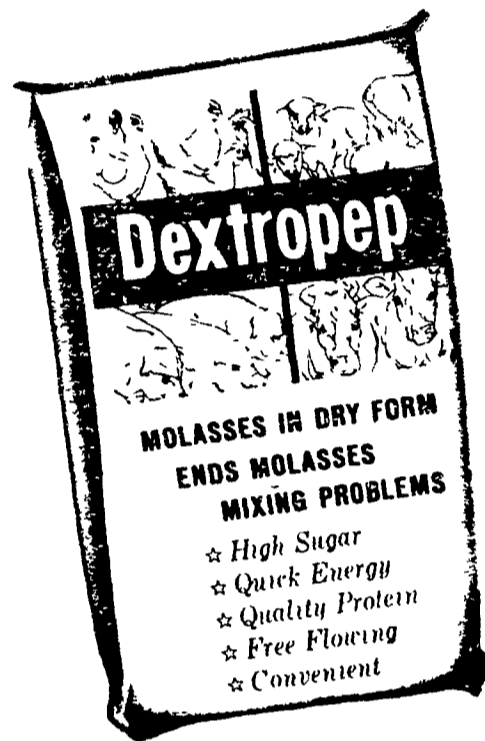
