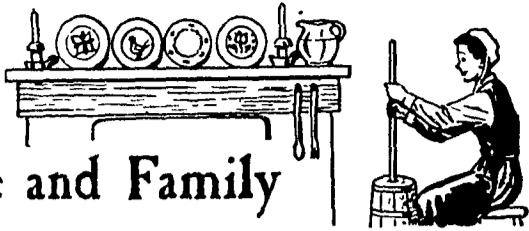

Add the milk gradually to the peanut butter, stirring until smooth
Beat egg slightly, add honey and salt, and stir to mix
Combine the two mixtures Pour into a small (1-pint) baking dish. Set baking dish in a pan of hot water and bake at 325 degrees about 30 minutes, or until custard is set. Makes four 1/2-cup servings

HONEY-APPLE CRISP

2 cups pared and sliced apples
2 tablespoons sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons lemon juice
1/4 cup all-purpose flour
1/4 cup liquid honey
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter or margarine

Place apples in a shallow baking dish. Combine the sugar, lemon juice and honey. Spread

HONEY SALAD DRESSING

1 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon powdered dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon celery salt
1/2 cup liquid honey
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 cup vinegar
1 cup salad oil

Mix the dry ingredients. Add the honey, lemon juice, and vinegar. Slowly add the salad oil, beating until well blended. Makes about 2 cups

HONEY SANDWICH FILLING

1 Beat together until fluffy three tablespoons liquid or creamed honey and a 4 ounce package cream cheese. Use about 2 tablespoons of the filling to a sandwich.
2 Honey with chopped dried fruits and chopped nuts if desired.
3 Honey and chopped or grated orange peel.
4 Honey and peanut or almond butter.

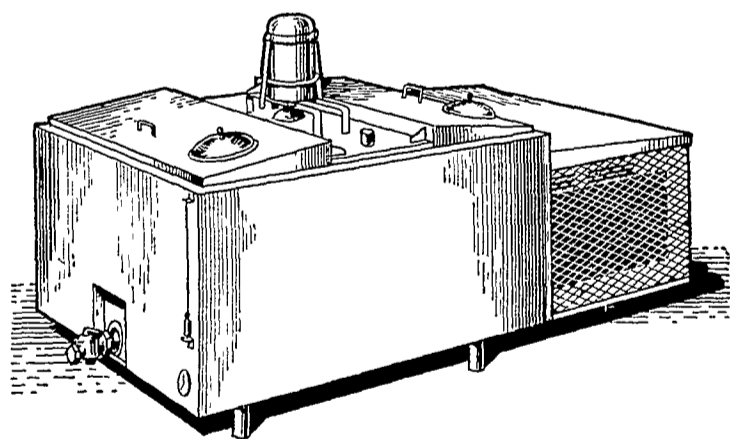
