# N. Y. Dressed Meat Market Slow, Lower

NEW YORK, JULY 2 — Very poor clearing of steer beef anticipated at New York and carry-over anticipated unless last minute flurry should develop, but beef sellers holding dim outlook.

Steer beef rounds and arm chucks troublesome from sales standpoint, with chucks \$2.00 to \$4.00 below week previous. And rounds off \$1.00 or more. Plates, briskets and flanks moving quite readily to processing units, and fairly broad inquiry continues for ribs and loin cuts.

Carcass prices mostly lower, and bulk moderate available supply in choice grade.

Veal, calf and spring lamb will probably clear well. Demand fair for veal and calf, and prices steady. Chain accounts active for spring lamb carcasses and sales to such outlets reflect 50 cents decline shown for choice 55 lb Down carcasses.

Fresh pork clearing promptly and prices steady to strong.

Prices for carlots tseer beef and spring lamb steady, with week previous, although very limited purchase, both classes for week to date. Compared with Tuesday Steer beef steady to mostly 50 cents and \$1.00 lower, cow beef, veal and calf unchanged, spring lamb mostly steady to 10 cents lower, fresh pork loins and other primal wholesale pork cuts steady to strong, prime steer carcasses 600 to 900 lbs \$48.50 to \$52.00. Choice 600 to 800 lbs \$45.00 to \$48.00, 800 to 900 lbs. \$44.50 to \$47.00, prime veal 90 to 120 lbs. \$53.00 to \$56.00, choice \$46.00 to \$51.00. Choice and prime spring lamb 55 lbs down. \$52.50 to \$56.00, 55 TP 65 lbs. \$52.00 to \$53.00; Pork loins 8 to 12 lbs. \$57.00 to \$61.00 12 to 16's \$57.00 to \$60.00, Boston butts 4 to 8 lbs. \$47.00 to \$50.00, fresh skinned hams 12 to 16 lbs. \$51.00 to \$55.00, spare-ribs 3 lbs down \$52.00 to \$55.00, choice steer hindquarters, \$53.50 to \$58.00, arm chucks \$36.00 to \$40.00, ribs \$58.00 to \$63.00.

Locally dressed - Tuesday Market - Steer hindquarters. Supply near normal, prices steady demand mostly fair. Prime \$58.00 to \$64.00, choice \$53.50 to \$58.00. Kosher steer forequarters: Supply normal, prices barely steady to mostly weak, demand narrow. Prime \$44.00 to \$47.00, choice \$41.00 to \$44.00.

ity and commercial bulls \$22.50-24.50 with few head to \$25. Good and choice 160-230 lb vealers \$25.30.

A 47 head string of 585 lb mostly common Ganta-Gertrudis stock heifers \$20.50 and 26 head 600 lb omnicon, same breed, stock steers \$23.

HOGS Butchers were moderately active and fully steady to 25 cents higher than last Thursday. Bulk supply mixed lots US No 1, 2, and 3, 190-220 lb butchers including a few 220-230 lbs Mixed No 1-3, 190-230 lb butchers mostly one price at \$25.50, around 150 head more uniform No 1's, mostly No 1 and 2 200-215 lbs \$25.75. Few lots mostly No 2 and 3, 248-257 lb butchers \$24.50-25, one lot No 3, 280 lbs \$23 and one lot No 1.3, 181 lbs \$25.25. Few head mixed No 1-3, 300-400 lb sows \$19.50-20.50.

SHEEP Spring slaughter lambs were active and fully steady to strong. Bulk 74.97 lb good and choice spring slaughter lambs \$24.24-25, two lots 83.90 lb choice to prime \$25. A 50 head lot 77 lbs utility and good \$23 with two lots 64.66 lbs mostly utility \$16.19. Package 48 lb cull and utility \$13. Scattered head 105-185 lb utility and good slaughter ewes \$5.6.

# Some Holiday Distraction Noted In Early Broiler Sales Reports

PHILADELPHIA, July 1 — The broiler market at the beginning of the week showed general weakness and unsettled feeling, brought on mostly by the prospect of a short week due to the holiday.

Last week the Delmarva broiler-feed ratio showed a two point up turn, despite nearly steady prices for broilers. A \$3.62 a ton decrease in feed prices caused the ratio increase.

The ratio is nearly steady with that of a year ago.

Here is how the market looked in the major broiler and fryer producer areas on Tuesday.

DELMARVA Quiet Trading very light. Prices paid at the farm were 21 to 21½ cents. Of 156,400 head, six per cent were at 21 cents, less than one per cent at 21 1/16, 26 per cent at 21 3/32, nine per cent at 21 40, and 44 per cent at 21½ cents. Fifteen per cent of the sales were at undetermined prices.

GEORGIA Offerings prices mostly a cent lower, supplies ample for decreased buying interest. However, sizes in some instances were becoming larger than desired. Buyers offering prices were 20 and 21½ cents, mostly 20 cents.

NORTH CAROLINA Offerings adequate, demand fair to good. Prices at the farm were 20 to 21 cents, with 644,000 head being sold. The bulk of the sales were at 20 cents.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY Supply equal to demand for the short week. Prices were 21 to 22 cents for 208,000 head. Most sales were for 21 cents. Heavy hens 19½ to 21, light types 14 cents.

ARKANSAS Offerings increased and ample to excessive at some points and adequate at others. The going price

was 21 cents with some undergrade at 20 cents.

ALABAMA Demand continues good, offerings and supplies adequate and trading heavy. Prices were from 20 to 20¼ cents for 443,960 head. Eighty-nine per cent of the sales were at 20 cents, two per cent at 20¼ cents, and nine per cent undetermined.

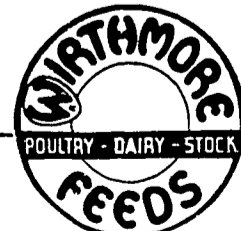
