

Broilers Continue Steady

In Major Producing Areas

Trading was light but steady with offerings ample to fully ample in most of the major broiler producing areas at the beginning of the week. The prices at Delmarva on Tuesday ranged from 18 to 18 1/4 cents. No sale was held at the Eastern Shore Poultry Exchange on Monday.

The Delmarva broiler feed ratio was up slightly from last week. Ratio this week was 3.7 compared to last week's 3.6. Broilers averaged 18.63 cents and feed cost \$100.50 per ton.

Here is a look at the activity at the beginning of the week in some of the major producing areas.

DELMARVA Market steady. Trading light and mostly at undetermined prices. Prices paid at farms up to 10.30 a m Tuesday were from 18 1/2 to 18 3/4 cents. 140,600 head were sold with 5 per cent going at 18 1/2 cents, 23 per cent at 18 3/4 cents and 72 per cent undetermined. One lot of

heavy hens sold for 16 1/2 cents. **GEORGIA** Offerings generally ample to fully ample in a few instances. Demand was fair to good. Prices at farms were 17 cents for 799,900 head, 499,300 head FOB plants at 18 cents.

NORTH CAROLINA Offerings adequate. Demand fair to good. Prices paid up to 10 a m Tuesday 17 cents for 619,700 head. Heavy hens at farms 14 to 16 months, 15 to 16 cents.

SHENANDOAH VALLEY Offerings adequate for fair to mostly good demand. Prices paid at farms up to 11 a m Tuesday 17 to 18 1/2 cents.

ARKANSAS Generally excessive throughout the state. Prices paid and volume distribution at farms up to noon Tuesday was 13,319 head at 15 to 16 percent, 30 percent at undetermined prices, 1 per cent at 15 cents, 60 per cent at 16 cents, Intra-Company sales booked 9 per cent at 16 cents.

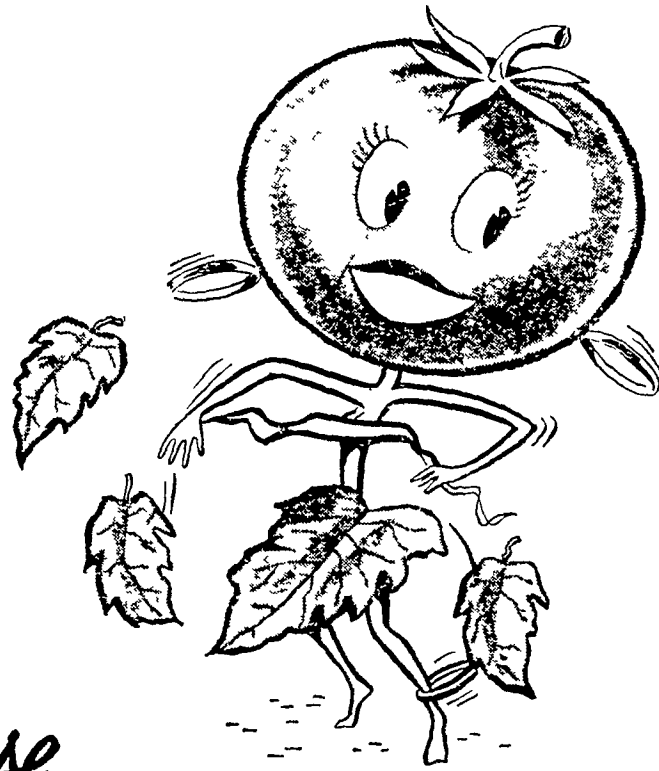

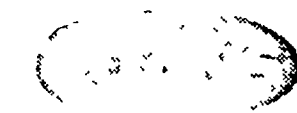

Steers Higher In Active Trade At Chicago Yards

CATTLE AND CALVES 18,000 Slaughter steers active, 50-100 largely 50-75 cents higher, slaughter heifers active, 50-75 cents mostly 50 cents higher. Cows steady to weak. Bulls fully steady. Vealers steady. Scattered loads mostly prime 1200-1375 lb. Slaughter steers \$27.75-28.25 but most of these lots carrying small choice end. Load mostly prime 1322 lbs at \$28.25 feed lot mates of \$27.59 cattle last Monday. Most choice and prime slaughter steers \$14.00/lbs and blow \$26.75-27.75, largely \$27.25-27.50 on 1100-1250 lb. Weights bulk good to high choice slaughter steers \$24.75-27.25, most choice steers \$25.75, load average to high choice 1300 lb steers at \$27.00 feedlot mates to \$26.25 cattle last Wednesday and several loads high-choice 1150-1300 lb steers \$27.50. Few lots standard and low-good.

HOGS 8,000. Moderately active through midsession later trade dull most barrows and gilts 25-50 cents lower, closing 50 cents to as much as 75 cents lower on few hundred head. Sows moderately active, mostly 25 cents lower. No. 1, 3, 190-230 lb butchers comprise bulk, liberal share No. 1 and 2 grades U S No. 1 to 3, 195-225 lb barrows and gilts \$20.50-21.25, mostly \$20.75 and above for weights over 200 lbs. No. 1, and 2, 200-225 lbs \$21.25-21.50. These late down to \$21.00. Several lots No. 1 these weights \$21.35-21.60. No. 2 and 3, 230-270 lbs. Relatively scarce at \$21.59-21.75, around 100 head at \$21.75 few mixed grades 180-195 lbs \$20.00-21.25. Mixed grades 400-500 lb sows \$19.00-20.00, most 300-400 lbs \$20.00-21.00, few head 300 lbs and lighter \$21.25.

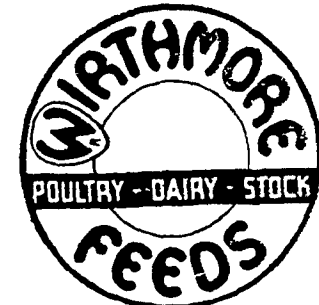
