Americans Eating Less Meat in 1958

In 1958 each person in the United States will use about 150

pounds of all meats That's the figure currently forecast by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, says Mrs. Elsie Keeney, extension specialist, of Pennsylvania State University.

This would be nine pounds less

than last year and quite a bit below the record of 166.7 pounds set in 1956. The use of beef is expected to be about 79 pounds for each person and the use of pork about 60 pounds. Both amounts are slightly less than last year.

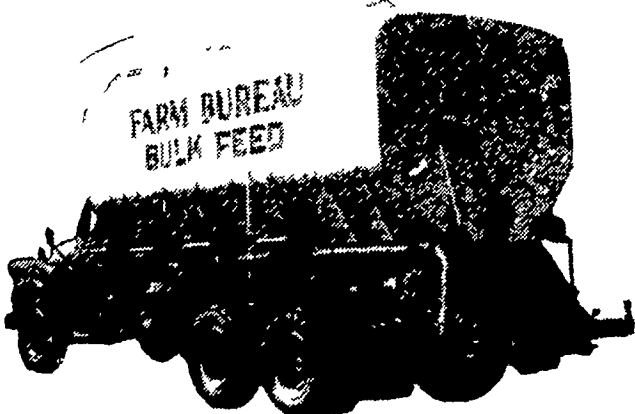

Diversion Provision For Phila. Milk Market is Studied

WASHINGTON — An additional proposal was brought up for discussion at a hearing Thursday considering addition of a diversion provision to the Philadelphia Federal milk marketing order. USDA officials announced today.

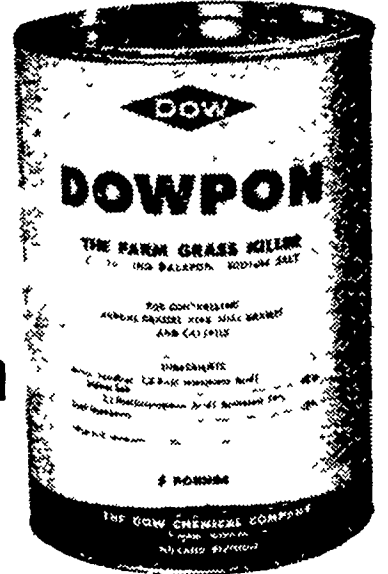
Amendments to the Philadelphia order proposed in the first notice of hearing would permit unlimited diversion of milk among plants of regulated handlers and diversions to unregulated plants under specified conditions.

The additional proposal, would permit milk received at the producer milk plant of a cooperative association to be designated as a

receipt at the producer milk plant of a proprietary handler and to be treated as if physically received there.

Both handlers would be required to file prior written notice of such proposed transaction with the market administrator. The proposal would have the effect, the applicants stated, of eliminating unnecessary hauling and handling of milk subject to regulation under the order.

Evidence brought out at the hearing will be considered by USDA before any changes in the order are recommended. Proposed amendments, if recommended, would be submitted to handlers and producers for exceptions and then to producers for approval or disapproval. Approval of two-thirds or more of the producers voting in a referendum is required before USDA can amend the order.
