

## County Entries At 'Keystone' Swell Classes

HARRISBURG — Fred Frey RD2, Quarryville, winner of the on-foot phase of the steer carcass show at the Pennsylvania National Livestock Exposition last year, has entered three head of Angus steers in the 1958 show.

The 1958 Livestock Exposition will be held November 10 through 14 at the State Farm Show Building in Harrisburg. There is no admission charge to the big livestock show which is expected to draw up to 100,000 visitors this year. Deadline for livestock entries is October 1.

Frey, a young breeder who maintains a sizable registered Angus herd in southern Lancaster County, is among 14 Pennsylvania breeders who have entered livestock in the show as of today. Cattle entries so far total 96 head, including state and out of state entries.

Other Lancaster Countians to be showing in the beef division are Miss Betty Jane Hess, Elizabethtown, Dennis Sangrey, Conestoga, Miss Leona Augsburg, Reinholds, and John A. Harsh, Kinzers. Sangrey is showing two animals in the junior show, the other junior showmen one animal each.

A. B. C. and Edna Groff's Stuffer Homestead Farm, East Earl, has entered 36 head of Hampshire swine in the Keystone International Manager Earl Fisher will show 11 head in the breed ring class, nine head in market classes, six head in the carcass show and 10 head in the truckload show.

Stauffer Homestead Farm recently swept 15 of 19 first places in swine shows at the Reading (Berks County) Fair and the Pennsylvania Hampshire Show. The farm had both grand and reserve boars.

A total of 439 head of cattle, swine and sheep form the vanguard of an anticipated 3,000 head entry list for the Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition. To be held in conjunction with the Keystone International will be the Tommy Steiner World Championship Rodeo, November 11 through 15 and the first Mid-Atlantic National Truck Show, November 10 through 15.

## Dairy Shrine Club To Honor Leaders

WATERLOO, Iowa — Nine leaders of the dairy industry will be honored by the Dairy Shrine Club here on October 1.

The awards include eight posthumous "pioneer" awards and one present "Guest of Honor" recognition.

Guest of honor at the Dairy Shrine Club's 1958 annual meeting will be Fred S. Idtse, secretary of the Brown Swiss Cattle Breeders Association, Beloit, Wis. His portrait will be hung in the Dairy Shrine Club, which is located opposite the main entrance to the Dairy Cattle Congress grounds.

Idtse will be presented by Dr. H. H. Kildee, dean emeritus, Iowa State College.

The eight Pioneers to be honored posthumously include F. W. Atkeson, 1893-1958, former head

of dairy husbandry at Kansas State College, Frank B. Astroth, 1893-1956, a Minnesota Jersey breeder and one-time president of the American Jersey Cattle Club, W. J. Hardy, 1892-1955, secretary and organizer of the American Milking Shorthorn Society; and John Hetts, 1879-1958, famous Wisconsin Holstein breeder.

Also, T. B. Macaulay, 1861-1942, Canadian Holstein breeder; James M. McDonald, 1881-1957, New York Guernsey breeder, Frank B. Morrison, 1887-1958, author and Cornell University dairy professor; and S. M. Salisbury, 1889-1954, Ohio State dairy professor.

The Dairy Shrine Club, organized in 1949, meets annually to honor great dairy leaders of the past and present, and to help inspire those of the present and future. Dedicated to dairying, the Club now has over 1,000 life members.

## Nut Growers Seek State's Best Tree

Who knows of the tree that produces the best hickory nuts to be found anywhere in Pennsylvania? That's a question being asked by the Pennsylvania Nut Growers Association.

This "best" tree possibly may be found on your farm. The association is offering attractive prizes in an effort to locate a source of superior hickory nuts.

Purpose of the quest is to improve hickory nut production. Why? Good nut-bearing trees of various species are desirable in every community. This is especially true where public recreation areas are being developed. Nuts are a source of food for wild life. Gathering nuts always has been a pleasant pastime and always will be, especially for boys and girls.

Ten cash prizes, ranging up to \$25, are being offered. So, if you

want to have some fun and perhaps get paid for it, gather thirty nuts from your favorite hickory tree and submit them — before November 15 — as an entry in the association's contest.

Entries must be of unnamed varieties and from seedlings only. Any Pennsylvania resident may make any number of entries, but only one from any one tree. Entry blanks, with full information, may be obtained at the county agent's office.

Parcel post the nuts in a strong box, carefully labeled, to William S. Clarke, Jr., department of horticulture, Tyson Building, Pennsylvania State University, University Park, Pa. This department and the division of agricultural extension at the University are cooperating with the association in its nut improvement program.

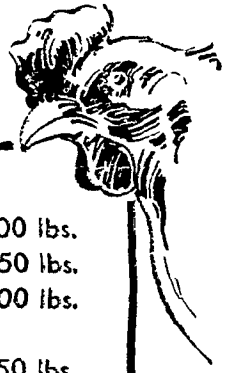
