

### Auction Offers Graded Feeder Stock

The last of a series of statewide feeder calf auctions, totaling 1750 animals, is scheduled to be held Nov 1 at the Lancaster Live Stock Yards with 400 head of uniformly grouped lots of feeder animals.

Similar sales were conducted Oct 1 to 3 at Butler, Brookville and Waynesburg, with 175, 100 and 700 head at each sale respectively.

Another sale is scheduled with 350 head to be sold at the Bedford County Fairgrounds, Bedford Oct 30.

The Butler, Brookville, and Bedford sales are sponsored by local feeder calf sales associations. The Waynesburg sale was sponsored by the Southwestern

Pa Livestock Breeders association.

Lancaster Livestock Exchange and Pa Livestock and Allied Industry association will sponsor the local sale.

Extension livestock specialists from Penn State University will sort and grade the calves prior to the sales for grouping them in uniform lots. County agents assist with the sales.

All sales offer Hereford and Angus calves, and most offer Shorthorns. Aside from providing producers with an outlet for their calves and buyers with a supply of good stock, the sales will perform an educational service by helping to stimulate better beef cattle programs.

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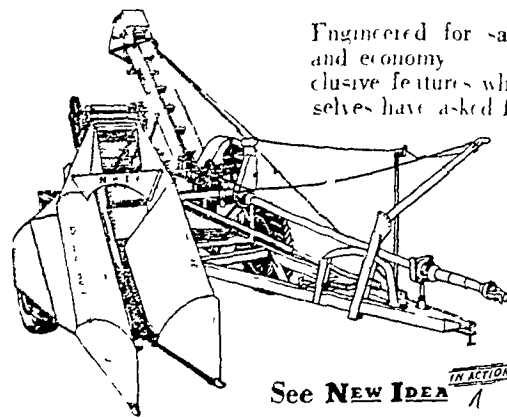

### To Honor Year's Leader

### Poultry Marketing Research Award Nominations Open

CHICAGO — The Poultry and Egg National Board has announced that it is now receiving nominations for its 1958 Research Achievement Award.

PENB's Technical Advisory Committee, which is appointed by the Poultry Science Association, will select the recipient from the list of candidates nominated.

The PENB Research Achievement Award was first presented in 1955. It consists of an appropriate plaque and additional honors that may be designated by the Poultry and Egg National Board.

The award has three principal objectives: (1) to recognize outstanding achievement in the fields of poultry products technology and marketing, (2) to encourage investigators to intensify their efforts in those areas of research which will lead to the increased consumption of poultry and eggs, and (3) to help publicize research and its contribution to Poultry and Egg National Board objectives.

#### Regulations Governing Granting of Award

The award shall be given annually for outstanding achievements in the field of poultry products research covering areas of processing, quality preservation, nutritive value, new and improved product development, and/or merchandising.

Any resident of the United States or Canada shall be eligible to receive the award. Membership in any professional association is not a prerequisite. Previous recipients of the award or its predecessor (the CHRISTIE AWARD) are not eligible.

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
