

It's The Law

Q A small contractor did some work at man's home and the man refuses to pay the \$50 due for no reason at all. He owns his own home in his and his wife's name. He owns an automobile. His home is nicely furnished. What should the small contractor do? — M A

A The contractor should sue the man for whom he did the work for the amount due before any magistrate, justice of the peace or alderman. Once a judgment has been obtained in such a suit, the contractor could execute against such property as the automobile or house furnishings to satisfy the judgment. The contractor would have no right to file what is known as a mechanic's lien against the property for the work which he did since such liens cannot be filed where the sum claimed is under \$100.

Q Is it proper for an insurance company to pay an insurance premium to the mortician in the event of the death of the policy-

holder, when the policy is held by you and not assigned to the mortician? — J S

A The answer to your question would depend upon the terms of the insurance policy. Frequently, insurance policies contain what is known as a facility of payment clause which permits the insurance company to make payment to any person appearing to the company to be entitled to the proceeds by reason of having incurred an expense on behalf of the insured person for his or her burial, or for any other purpose.

Q. What year was common-law marriage first recognized in Pennsylvania? — P R

A. The case of Chambers vs Dickinson, 2 S & R 475 (1816) decided in 1816 is normally regarded as the leading early Pennsylvania authority recognizing what is now called a "common law" marriage. As is pointed out in Freedman Law of Marriage and Divorce in Pennsylvania, 48, fr. 3 the decision in reality did not sustain the validity of the "common law" marriage but merely held that a presumption of marriage arises by reason of cohabitation and reputation and being merely a presumption, it can be rebutted by showing that no marriage actually existed.

Prospects Reported Good for Dollar Sale of U. S. Fruit to United Kingdom

Good prospects for sale of substantial quantities of U. S. fruit to the United Kingdom for dollars for the first time since World War II were reported today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Such sales would be a major step toward regaining the British dollar market for U. S. fruit producers, according to USDA spokesmen.

Department optimism toward possibility of U. S. fruit exporters making commercial dollar sales to Britain was based upon a recent announcement by the Board of Trade in London indicating that about \$20 million (f. o. b. cost) would be allocated for imports of fresh, canned and dried fruit from the Dollar Area for the coming 1958-59 fruit season. The Dollar Area consists of U. S., Cuba, Canada, and several Central American countries.

The Board of Trade indicated that Britain would import no more fruit from the United States under currency conversion or aid programs, such as Title I of Public Law 480. Most U. S. fruit exports to the United Kingdom since World War II have been financed under currency conversion programs. These programs were carried out with International Cooperation Administration funds in 1955-56; with both ICA and Title I, Public Law 480 funds in 1956-57, and under Title I, Pub-

lic Law 480 in 1957-58.

Prior to World War II, the United Kingdom provided a traditional and significant market for U. S. fruit. During the past 10 years Britain prohibited dollar imports of U. S. fruits, with the exception of limited quantities of apples, canned pineapples, and concentrated orange juice.

In order to continue fruit shipments to the United Kingdom, the United States has negotiated sales of surplus fruit under currency conversion programs each season since 1953-54. These, however, were not entirely satisfactory from the U. S. trade standpoint.

This new program provides a continuing opportunity to market U. S. fruits in the United Kingdom on a dollar commercial basis.
