## المراجع والمراجع والمراجع Winterize Your Cattle Herd Now

November is a good time to winterize the barn and the cattle herd, says Assistant Chester County Agent Frank E. Bortz. A little attention now may prevent diseases and parasites from taking a heavy toll of profits during the winter months ahead.

Penn State dairy and veterinary specialists list these seven points to consider before cattle are housed for the winter:

1. Check ventilation facilities, eliminate drafts, but be sure cows will get enough air to provide better general health and guard against pneumonia.

2. Spray cattle with Lindane solution one to two lbs. of 25 per cent wettable Lindane powder to 100 gallons of water-to eliminate lice and mange. (Caution - Be sure to wash udder thorough-

3. Have the heifers, which KEEP FEED COSTS LOW have been on pasture, checked for internal parasites and worm them if necessary. Examine barn feeding facilities to be sure feed cannot be contaminated by manure.

4. Check the bedding supply. A little more bedding may prevent costly mastitis this winter. Remember that cow comfort means better cow health.

5. Bid farm Buildings of rats, mice, sparrows and pigeons. They serve to bring in wintertime diseases.

6. Check heifers between four and eight months to-be sure they have been vaccinated against brucellosis.

7. Clip udders and hind quarters to keep them cleaner and promote better milk quality. Clean cows are healthier cows.

Increase milk profits.
