**Endrin Known  
Dangerous  
To All Fish**

Two Commonwealth agencies warned orchardists today that careless use of a pesticide known as "Endrin" could cause widespread killings of fish

The warning was contained in a statement issued by William Voight, Jr., executive director of the Pennsylvania Fish Commission, and Secretary of Agriculture William L Henning. The statement said:

"Endrin is one of the most powerful of known pesticides. Research has shown that a concentration in water as small as four parts per billion will kill fish.

"This poison has been used for a number of years, and is registered for use in Pennsylvania, for killing orchard mice and other pests. Manufacturer's labels urge extreme care in handling and applying this pesticide.

"We are informed by competent research specialists that the killing component or compounds in Endrin do not break down and dissipate. Their effects are progressive and cumulative.

Therefore, unlike many other lethal-to-fish substances that disappear as a result of the normal body functions of a fish, Endrin is stable. It accumulates in the fish liver and can be isolated and identified through simple laboratory tests.

"Endrin is a contact poison, not something that animals must chew. In view of this, users should take the utmost precautions to protect themselves. After using Endrin, farmers should wash their hands and any soiled clothing thoroughly.

"This is the time of year when orchardists customari-

ly spray for mice. It also is a time when it will be relatively easy for the poison to reach and pollute streams.

Endrin is best applied before the ground freezes because it is less likely to result in excessive run-off.

"Unless the utmost care and caution are taken, fish in large numbers could be killed. Both Clean Streams Act and the Fish Code prevent polluting the waters of Pennsylvania and provide penalties for violation."

Voight said fish wardens have been alerted to the dangers of Endrin and instructed to visit personally as many orchardists as possible to advise them of the hazards.

A man whose normal weight is 150 pounds would weigh about 50 pounds if all the water in his system were dried up.

**State's '58 Crop Output  
Up \$43-million Over '57**

Harrisburg—Value of Pennsylvania's principal crops during 1958 is reported by the State Department of Agriculture at \$317 million, a 16 per cent increase over the 1957 valuation of \$274 million.

Nearly all of the Commonwealth's major crops, except potatoes and apples, recorded an increase in value of production, according to the Pennsylvania Crop Reporting Service.

Corn production was valued at \$103 million and spearheaded the State's increase with a gain of \$26 million over the previous year. All hay output was valued at \$101 million and dollarwise was the second most important crop in the Keystone State.

Farm value of tobacco rose 65 per cent above the 1957 value and was the largest percentage increase registered by any of the major crops.

"The increase in farm value this year is mainly the result of the record high yields of most of the major crops," the Crop Reporting Service said.

Pennsylvania's 1958 corn production — 82,202,000 bushels — was the largest on record and 30 per cent above the 1947-56 average. Yield per acre of all corn at 65.5 bushels was 17 per cent above the 56 bushel record set in 1956.

The Commonwealth's 1957 wheat production hit 16,920,000 bushels, an increase of 18.7 per cent over the 1957 crop which was the lowest on record. The average wheat yield of 30 bushels per acre also set a record.

The oats yield at 43.5 bushels exceeded the previous record by one bushel, while 37,500 birds were listed. There also established a new mark

Fall potato yield at 175 hundredweight per acre was 9 per cent above the record established in 1954. While total 1958 potato output at 9,530,000 hundredweight was 27 per cent above last year, the yield was 10 per cent under the 1949-56 average.

Pennsylvania's tobacco yield hit 1,700 pounds per acre and equalled the record set two years ago. Hay output totaled 3,828,000 tons, 21 per cent above last year's low crop.

The State's 1958 peach crop—3,100,000 bushels—exceeded last year's output by 35 per cent and equalled the Commonwealth's record output. The commercial apple crop at 6,400,000 bushels was 3 per cent under 1957. Grape production totaled 25,000 tons, 28 per cent over the light crop in 1957.
