HARRISBURG-A three point drop in the index of prices received by Pennsylvania farmers for all their products in the month ended December 15 was reported today by the State Department of Agriculture.

The Pennsylvania Crop Re porting Service said the index for all farm products stood at 238 on December 15, eight points under the same date last year. An index of 100 equals the 1910-14 base price period.
