Milk Flow Sets Record

Penna milk production for 1958 is estimated at a record high 6 675 million pounds, three per cent above 1957 production of 6,462 million
 December, with 525 million was the only month during 1958 which did not result in a record level, according to the state crop reporting service
 Milk cow numbers continued to decline during December as high slaughter prices and production expenses resulting in heavy herd culling
 In spite of exceptional cold and poor quality hay in some sections, production per cow for December was at a record 564 lbs
 The year's production per cow, also was at an all-time record of 7,147 lbs per cow

Poultry Assn. Meets Friday

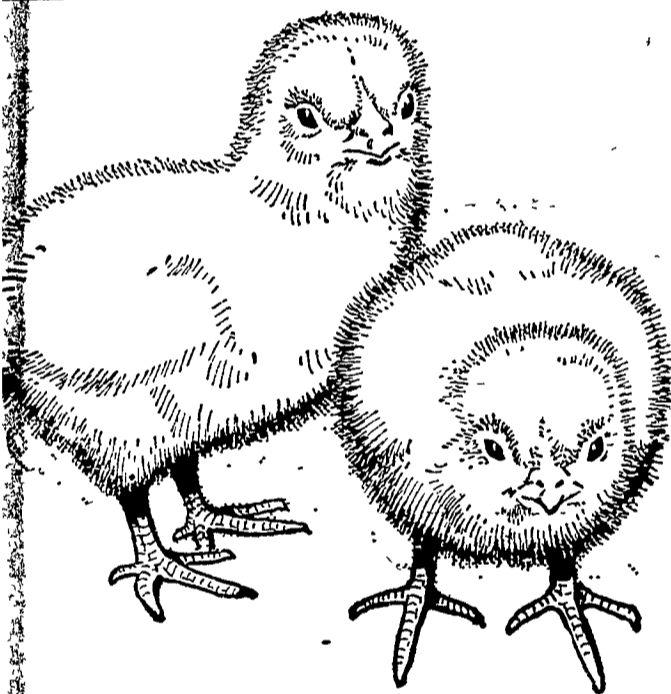
The 1959 Membership meeting of the Lancaster County Poultry Association has been scheduled for 7 30 p.m., Jan 23 at the Poultry Center

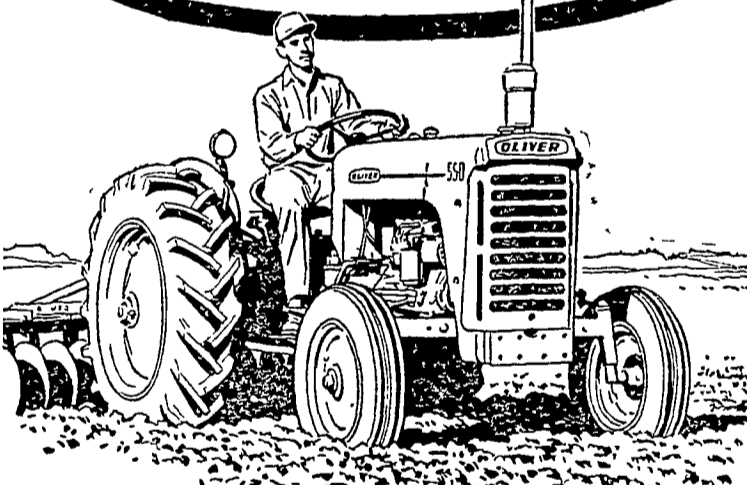
