

## This Club Believes in Work

Currently in the midst of an eight-lesson program of weekly educational meetings, the Lancaster County 4-H Farm and Home Electric Club is a 36-member group specializing in electricity on the farm.

Meetings are being conducted every Wednesday evening in the Greist Building, Lancaster. During each meeting the group studies, through lectures, movies, demonstrations, group discussions and reading, the problems, uses and needs of electricity.

This is the fifth year of the new program of club specialization under 4-H. The year's activities include nine meetings, one organization and eight study sessions.

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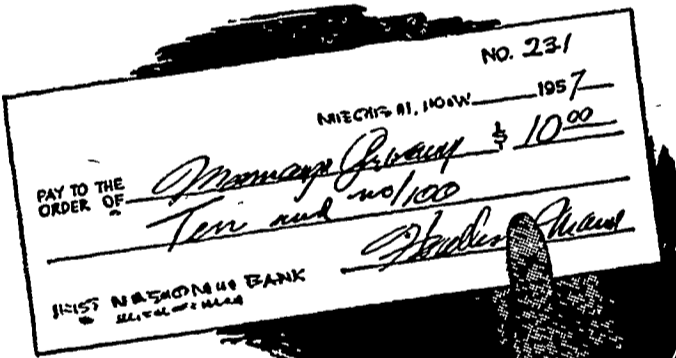
