Cattle ranging from 30 to 48 months of age carry a slightly thin fat covering which is primarly in evidence over the back, loin, and ribs. The brisket, rear flanks and cod or udder show only slight fullness.

Cattle under 30 months of age carry only a thin covering of fat which is largely restricted to the back, loins, and upper rib

Standard grade cattle frequently have the heavy bone and prominent hips and shoulders associated with coarseness or the small bone, tight hide, and angularity denoting over-refinement.

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
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
