### Wheat Disposal Deadline Near Lancaster Rotarians Host Berry Clubbers

Farmers of Lancaster County have only until June 7 to dispose of wheat planted in excess of their acreage allotments according to Landis G. Becker, Lancaster county ASC Chairman.

Becker cited several advantages for the wheat grower who disposes of excess acres and brings his acreage for harvest down to the allotment.

These include eligibility for wheat price support and Soil Bank payments, freedom from a marketing quota penalty on wheat and credit for acreage diverted from wheat this year in computing his allotment in future years.

Farmers who have any questions about excess wheat disposal are urged to get in touch with the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office for further information.
