## Broiler Breeders Still Building Primary Flocks

Indicated placement of pullet chicks for broiler hatchery supply flocks by leading U. S. primary breeders of broiler replacement stock totaled 3,765,000 chicks during April. This was 13 per cent more

than in April, 1958. Domestic placements during April totaled 3,573,000 chicks. Part of the increase in chicks during April as compared with a year earlier was due to the fact that for a number of hatcheries there were nine days when hatches were taken off in April this year, compared with eight days last year.

So far for 1959 placement of broiler supply pullets totaled 11,743,000 head, compared with 10,690,000 head during Jan. 1 - May 1 of 1958, and 9,454,000 head in 1957.

The four-month total for 1959 is equal to almost half of total placements for 1957, while running about 10 per cent ahead of 1958.

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

## Some Essentials in the Proper Feeding and Care of Dairy Cows

1. Use through-out the year, economical well balanced rations which provide good nutritive requirements.
2. Adjust the amount of feed for each cow to her actual production.
3. Use palatable rations containing a reasonable variety of feed-stuffs.
4. Rations should be slightly laxative rather than constipating.
5. Plenty of good water readily accessible.
6. Dry periods of proper length.
7. Comfortable surroundings both in winter and during summer season.
8. Regularity in feed and care.
9. Kindness on the part of the herdsman.

Strict observance of these simple essentials will greatly improve net income from the dairy herd.


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
