### N.Y. Milk Order Change Approved Given More Time

Time for filing to the U. S. Department of Agriculture's decision on a proposed amendment to the New Jersey Federal marketing order extended from June to a date to be announced.

The extension was decided by a majority of producers supplying the area.

The proposed amendment recommended by the U. S. Department of Agriculture (Press Release US-59) would modify the milk under the order.
