Lancaster Dairy Herds Dominate Area Show

ABC-Bred Females Reflect Quality Record Exhibit of Sires' Progeny

A pair of breed Grand Championships for Lancaster breeders served to keep the home folks happy Wednesday and Thursday during the Eighth Annual South-Pa Artificial Breeders Co-op Cattle Show, at co-op quarters, northwest of Lancaster on Rt. 230 by-pass. The county area major victory came Wednesday evening, when Ralph E. Harnish II, Christiana 1, led his Sr. Yearling Ayrshire heifer, Glenhurst Dixie Pretty to Grand Champion Ayrshire honors.

More than 18 hours later, J. Mowery Frey, Jr., Lancaster completed county domination of the Holstein division when he exhibited Fultonway Rachel Ann, 30-month-old heifer, to Grand Champion Holstein placing. The SPABC show drew a record 365 entries this year, with a total prize money of \$3,000 in premiums going to exhibitors. County officials reported that the quality of this year's exhibit provided a definite improvement over previous years for the highest-quality and greatest number of

Spray Control, Management Stressed

Shown here are area tomato growers seeking the latest research information and extension specialists, Berggren, Taylor and Slamp, with Assoc. County Agent Harry S. Sloat. Farmers were urged to use three lbs. of Maneb per acre every 10 days for the rest of the season to control late blight. If blight appears, every 6 - 7 days. Chemical spray weed control on the plot shown here of four lbs. of Neburon per acre gave good results, applied about June 15, when fruit was small. It was used over entire plot. The Extension specialists emphasized that good management still is the vital factor in production of quality tomatoes. —LF PHOTO
