

Farmers were urged to use three lbs. of Maneb per acre every 10 days for the rest of the season to control late blight. If blight appears, every 6 - 7 days. Chemical spray weed control on the plot shown here of four lbs. of Neburon per acre gave good results, applied about June 15, when fruit was small. It was used over entire plot. The Extension specialists emphasized that good management still is the vital factor in production of quality tomatoes. ---LF PHOTO
