**Broiler Placements Falling**

Placements of broiler-type chicks in Penn. during the week ending August 29, at 144,000, were down 17 per cent from the previous week and 16 per cent below 845,000 placed during the corresponding week of 1958, according to the State Crop Reporting Service report of Sept. 2.

Out of state shipments of broiler-type chicks were 144,000, while inshipments totaled 51,000.

Indicated number of Pa. broilers for market in ten weeks is 738,000, 13 percent below last year. Total egg settings during the week were 11 million, 15 per cent

below the previous week and 12 per cent below a year ago. **22 State Report**  
Placements of broiler-type in the 22 important states during the week ending August 29, at 28.3 million, were down three per cent from the previous week and two per cent below the same week of last year.

Number of broilers for market in about 10 weeks is estimated at 27.8 million, down three per cent from a year ago.

Total hatchings, Aug. 29—Sept. 19, are expected to be nine per cent below a year ago.

**Poultry Federation Adds Feature To Dutch Days**

The Pennsylvania Poultry Federation has added a special "do-it-yourself" feature to this year's Festival in conjunction with the Annual Pennsylvania Days Celebration Aug. 30 at Hershey, Pa.

The new feature is "your own" demonstration where visitors will be able to barbeque their own chickens under the supervision of poultry specialists. The demonstration will be equipped with every back yard barbeque vice imaginable.

Visitors will be shown how to cook the poultry in the way they choose. In addition, there will be the traditional barbeque area where year 15,000 halves of chickens will be prepared for the Dutch Days crowd.

Selection of Miss Pennsylvania Poultry Industry for the Pennsylvania Poultry Industry Contest will be held during the show. Ceremonies will be held on Sunday, August 29.

**Extension Field Day Set**

County Agent Max M. Smith this week announced a pair of Field Days for the inspection of variety tests and mixtures with soybeans and corn and sorghum varieties, to be held on the farms of cooperating farmers Monday and Tuesday.

Smith reports that John Baylor, Penn State agronomist, will lead discussions, harvest plots and check

fields during the programs. The first Field Day will be at 7 p.m., Monday on the farm of Joseph Graybill, Manheim RD 1. The second will be on the farm of Armore P. Frey, Conestoga RD 1, at 9.30 a.m. Tuesday.

All interested farmers are urged to attend and observe test results first-hand, Smith said, and take the opportunity to query Baylor on particular problems.
