years and helped to organize a junior Homemaking club.

During 1958 Doris was chosen as the only girl member of the Lancaster County delegation of rural youth to attend the American Institute of Cooperation at Pennsylvania State University.

Participation in Church and Sunday School are among the most liked activities in Doris' life. She attends church regularly where she plays the piano at special occasions, sings in the choir and teaches a Sunday School class, in addition to taking an active part in young people's groups as officer and committee member.

Doris has been very active in the Southern Lancaster County Community where she has won numerous prizes.

The Title of Star Farmer of Lancaster County was conferred on John Wikor when he scored highest of the 20 Future Farmers of America who won the Keystone Farmer Degree in that organization.

John, Sentinel in the Garden Spot chapter at Lampeter-Strasburg High School, and a senior at the same school, started his farming program as a freshman with 8,000 broilers. John's father who works away from the farm had gone out of the broiler business prior to that time.

During his sophomore year John continued with his broilers and added 500 pullets to sell ready for the laying house. In addition, he entered into a 50 percent partnership agreement with his father on the rest of the farm.

This agreement continued in effect through his junior year in high school, but that year he raised 600 pullets.

Broilers did not look profitable to John last year, and he switched to all pullets. He has raised and sold 4600 birds for layers, this year and continued the partnership with his father. In addition to the 13 acres on the home place, John has rented 20 acres from a neighbor and this year raised 7½ acres of tobacco, 17 acres of corn, and two acres of hay. Ten Angus steers on the halves are also in his program. John had the high corn yield in his school in the one acre corn contest with 132.1 bushels, and was first in the three county area of Lancaster, York and Lebanon, in the FFA record book contest.

As an active member in the Lancaster Muzzle Loaders Association, John finds time to pursue his hobby of collecting antique guns.

Projects in both agriculture and home economics and activities in community clubs have won the outstanding girl 4-H member award for Linda Mumma.

At the present time Linda is attending Juniata College where she is majoring in Home Economics Education.

During 1955 Linda was a member of the State Championship Dairy judging team

and went on to become national winner in Geurnsey judging at Waterloo, Iowa at the National Dairy Cattle show.

Linda was a member of the Guernsey club for seven years during which time she served as president of the county group. During 1956 she was on the second place state dairy demonstration team and the following year was winner of the project score contest and showmanship contest for the Guernsey Club. During 1957 also she was elected secretary of the Lancaster County Agricultural 4-H council and the Landisville Home Economics Club.

In 1957 Linda won a blue ribbon for her demonstration on color schemes in the home, at the state club week at PSU. The following year she won first place in the state with her demonstration on clothing construction for which she was awarded a tip to the National 4-H Club congress in Chicago.
