WOODLOT SAFETY

Prevent injury when you work in your woodlot this winter. Penn State extension safety specialists stress that the axe handle should be strong and solidly mounted. Shut off the motor of the power chain saw when filling with gas. Be careful with footing and beware of falling trees.

Tractors powered with fuel cells, in addition to being virtually noiseless would move without hesitation and jerking and would need no clutch or transmission gears as we know them today. One lever could control speed and direction of the machine.

Keep house plants away from radiators, but guard against freezing on cold nights especially where these plants are close to windows. You can get many tips on care of plants from The Pennsylvania State University Circular 491, "Growing Better House Plants." Ask your county agricultural agent for a copy.

At present the biggest drawback to the new design is the weight and size of the machine required to furnish sufficient power, but this is being reduced all the time. It may be that the fuel cells will bring about the only significant change in tractor engines in the past three decades.

If a recipe calls for heavy cream and you're 'fresh out' you can substitute one third cup butter plus three fourths cup milk for each cup of heavy cream, university nutrition specialists advise.
