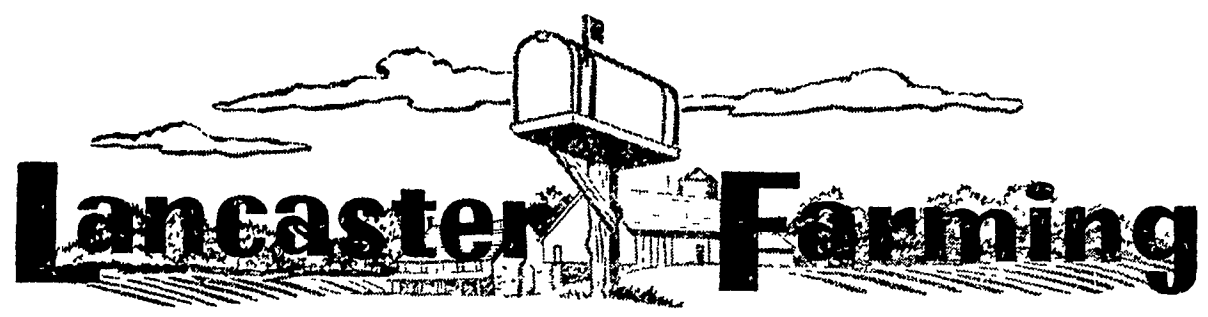
Tractor to be Shown

Evolutionary new tractor design will display at the Penn-Farm Show next

Tractor without pistons, carburetor, or plugs will be put on display by the Allis-Chalmers Company. The engine runs on what are known as fuel cells which produce power directly through chemical action without smoke, or noise prior to be one of the attractions of the show.

Such as propane from an outside source is immediately converted from chemical energy into electrical energy in a decomposing other electrolyte, but has considerable efficiency. ifications in a wide program of activities for her selection by the State Homemaker Degree Committee.

Pennsylvania will parade her "Plenty" for five days and four nights next week at the 44th annual Pennsylvania Farm Show. The show, an outgrowth of a few scattered exhibits of fruit and grains at annual meetings of a few farm organizations in Harrisburg prior to 1917 is expected to attract in the neighborhood of 650,000 visitors this year.

Those attending the show, the largest free indoor Agricultural Exposition in the United States under one roof will be mainly farmers and farm families from Pennsylvania. But these will by no means comprise the total attendance. Farmers and agricultural leaders from a score or more different states, Canada, and a number of foreign countries, and thousands of city and small town residents are attracted to this unique agricultural exposition.

The farm show this year will set a new record in the number of departments and the amount of money offered in premiums. Individual exhibitors will vie for honors and the \$63,125 in prize money in 27 departments of the show. Value of the exhibits, both commercial and competitive, is estimated to be in excess of \$7,000,000.

The approximately 2,000 head of horses, beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep and lambs on exhibit will make this the largest livestock show in the East. The poultry ranks as one of the five largest in the United States with about 4,000 birds expected to be exhibited.

These exhibits will be housed in the main show building which has approximately 11 acres under one continuous roof. This building including the small (Turn to page 6)
